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From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers,

In the last edition of Nobel News I promised some feedback on the staff training session that took place on Wednesday 3 February – as you will remember we closed 45 minutes early to facilitate this; thank you again for your understanding. We were working together during this time to formulate our plan to make sure our school develops 'outstanding' Nobelians. If we achieve this then the 'outstanding' Ofsted badge will follow, but our lovely school is here for its students not just to satisfy a government agency (our determined aim is to achieve both, however).

We have developed a simple approach to school development, something that all of us, be you a student, staff, parent or governor, can understand: a model that we can use to precisely measure the school's development. It is all based around the following sentence:

Nobelians RACE to achieve

where RACE is an acronym that can be used to display our intentions in the following poster:





Behind each of the letters the school has set targets and made commitments that will measure our success up to September 2017. It is based around our vision and we intend to display the poster around the school so that all Nobelians can 'buy-in' to what we are trying to achieve. A more detailed presentation of these ideas will feature on our website after half-term — we are very excited by this plan and would really like parents and carers to engage with it.

On a separate note, I should like to give parents ample notification that from September 2016 we intend to use e-mail to send letters to parents. However, for parents who do not have e-mail and to deliver 'legal' documents (such as exclusion notifications) letters will still be delivered in the traditional way – in times of tight budgets, this will save the school a significant amount of time and money. There will be more on how this will

work in future editions of Nobel News.

Finally, I should like to wish you all a good half-term holiday – we are making fantastic progress as a school, much of it down to the enthusiasm and support that we receive from parents and carers.

Well done to all these students for achieving excellent results on the day.





Available for the £2.15 FSM allowance are the following examples (although other combinations can be made for the same price, those listed are the more balanced options):

Main Hot lunch
Roasted topside of beef
Savoy cabbage
Glazed parsnip
Yorkshire pudding
Onion gravy
Roasted potatoes
£1.60

Slow braised lamb curry, coconut rice, chickpea daal, onion bhaji, mango chutney £1.60.

Freshly battered MSC cod and chips with beans or peas £1.60

These meals would leave 55p which could buy a hot daily dessert or a fresh fruit juice carton.

Other combinations outside the FSM recommendation:

Budget simple fill roll or sandwich £1.00 Fresh fruit 35p Fruit juice 55p Total £1.90

Regular sandwich (two fillings) £1.50 Tray bake 45p

Hot pasta meal 1 sauce 1 topping £1.60 Hot dessert of the day £0.55

Water is also available to students for free should they wish to spend their full FSM allowance on food alone.

We have also introduced daily hot 'Saver Items' on the hot grab and go counters advertised by a 'Saver Item' Menu board These are sold at 55p, 75p and 95p.
