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### From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers,

I hope you had a lovely half-term holiday; our teachers have returned with their batteries recharged and looking forward to the final push towards GCSE, AS and A level examinations. It is astonishing to think that there are only seven school weeks left until their examinations start. More on that in the next edition of 'Nobel News'. Back in the first half-term of the academic year we received a curious letter from Simon Newland, Assistant Director of Education at Hertfordshire County Council. Mr. Newland was encouraging Nobel and some other schools in the area to consider seeking to change their status; to move from being a maintained school to becoming a foundation school. Furthermore, the Prime Minister has said that the government wants all schools to be academies by 2020, therefore, we have to be realistic and make plans to preserve our lovely school; staying as a maintained school really is not an option for us. As a result, the Board of Governors set up a working party of governors and colleagues with the remit to investigate all of the possibilities open to us. Our underlying principle in our research was to preserve our independence and to maintain our autonomy - it was felt our school was making fantastic strides to becoming 'outstanding' and that the decision must preserve our values, vision and reputation. Having considered three options -stay as a maintained school, convert to an academy or become a foundation school - the Board

of Governors voted unanimously, in the first

Instance, to pursue changing the school's status from maintained to foundation. In order for this to happen, we do need to engage and consult with our 'stakeholders'. Therefore, there will be a meeting for all interested families on Wednesday 9 March at 5pm in the school library; if you wish to attend, and so that we can adequately cater for expected numbers, please email my PA Mrs. Coakes

On a very positive note, I can report that our special evening with 'The Nobel 42' proved very worthwhile and beneficial. These students were all in year 11 and had been identified as potential underachievers in the summer. The response from parents and students to this initiative has been fantastic and I'm sure it will lead to some real progress being made with all of them. For most of them, the help was around organisation and building resilience and self -esteem - each of them now has a teacher mentor - including me (lucky Will!) - who will coach and encourage them over the coming weeks. The vast majority of our year 11 Nobelians are on target to match or exceed expectations, so we are looking forward to another outstanding set of results.

#### Year 12 Public services visit

Year 12 public services students visited Stevenage fire station last week where they were faced with some basic entry tests and had a feel of a day in a life as a firefighter.

We arrived at Stevenage fire station for 9:30am where we were met by Ritchie Hanmer. We had a talk about the different rank structure within the fire service and Ritchie shared some personal experiences. The students then carried out a fitness test which consisted of: a bleep test; running with the hose; carrying a reel of hose; speed walking with weights and other equipment. The group was then given the experience in the smoke room where they had to enter a very small room, blind folded, and retrieve a 70lb dummy. Even though for health and safety reasons the room was not full of smoke they were still able to have the experience of being in a confined area whilst wearing heavy equipment. They scrambled up on split level floors and dragged the dummy back to the outside. Students were very grateful for the experience and would like to thank all the staff in White Watch for their experience and the new knowledge that they gained.

### **Science Faculty**

Humans have always been curious about the world around us. Questions like "where we come from?" and "what our place in the universe?" have stimulated discussion for thousands of years. Albert Einstein, the often misquoted scientist, put forward his theory of relativity 101 years ago. This is something that most of us remember as E=mc², but very few understand what it means, me included! However with the discovery of gravitational waves we might have a better chance. Below Dr Finn writes about what he did with his students to make sense of the discovery.

#### The Science Discovery of the Decade

On Thursday 11 February 2016 a momentous event in physics was announced, the discovery of gravitational waves. The use of the LIGO detectors on Earth to observe the collapse of two black holes in a distant galaxy, and through it validate Einstein's theory of relativity, was too exciting an event to not be covered in the physics classes on the next day. Students came into the classroom excited to ask if I had heard about the news, and whether I could explain it to them.

I took year 7, year 10 and year 13s out into the quad at the back of the school, and using nothing more than some people power, a bed sheet and some large massed spheres was able to explain these exciting findings, and give students an understanding of the complexities

#### A message for Year 11 students

Science always poses questions and we look for evidence to prove or disprove a theory. As we move towards the exam season one thing is clear: there is no substitute for hard work. However, how you revise is also important. The evidence is clear about how to revise:

- Avoid distractions. Turn your phone off and don't listen to music.
- Do not just highlight texts, re-read and summarise.

#### Instead do the following:

 Create some flashcards, with questions on one side and answers on the other – and keep testing yourself. of the Theory of Relativity. Amazingly some of the year 7 students were able to predict that the instrument measuring the waves on Earth would in fact increase and decrease in length as the wave passes through, and they have the potential for great things in science!


We have over thirty of Alan's books available to borrow from the library. The books cover a variety of genres, including, contemporary issues, football and horror.

For our job advertisement we created an animation which showed in detail what biomedical scientists do. This is a career that interested both of us and the competition


