From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers,

We are really pleased with the way we have started the new academic year and thrilled with the examination results that our hardworking students achieved; I should like to congratulate all those Nobelians who took examinations, we saw tremendous success at all levels.

Schools are now being measured using the new 'progress 8' indicator (measuring student progress rather than attainment) and early indications are the school has exceeded expectations on this – this will be confirmed at the end of September when all schools' student progress is gauged against other schools nationally. I will tell you more about 'progress 8' in a future edition of *Nobel News*.

On an individual basis, at GCSE, Matthew Wan, Haarith Aubad, Minal Karadia, Jade Bolt, Harry Draper and Matthew Banks all gained a clean sweep of A* and A grades. Our Sixth Form, which is now 300, is 50% bigger than three years ago. This increase is compounded by the 34 'new to Nobel' students joining us in Year 12. This is all very positive and evidence that our lovely school becomes more popular by the year. The slight downside of such expansion is that we are now really tight for space in the school, a nice challenge that we will need to face over the next few years.

At A level we achieved some of the very best results in the school's history, indeed good enough to classify progress in the Sixth Form as outstanding. There were great individual performances that deserve special mention - Harpreet Pannu, Michael Tsang, Bobby Banks, Dylan Butterfield, Dominic McEwen,



Clare Holtham, Philip Snoad, Ben Gray and Ellie Ward who all gained a clean sweep of A*s and As. Of these Bobby Banks (Head Boy) – physics, Ellie Ward (Head Girl) – geography and Ben Gray – history will all be going up to Oxford. This is a fantastic achievement, a first for Nobel. We really hope that these achievements act as a catalyst for our younger students to aim high. With every student moving on to university, work or a higher level apprenticeship, our Sixth Form really has had a fantastic year.

This is a phenomenal performance by the students supported by excellent teachers, support staff and parents. We have certainly had a very good year and we are absolutely determined to continue to improve. I have an expert staff and we have made some excellent appointments for this term. Please continue to support the school in whatever way you can; the best advertising comes from you when you discuss the school and its achievement with family, friends and neighbours.


On a different note, we are also focussing very much on the progress of students in key stage 3 (Yrs. 7, 8 and 9) and realise that some of the changes to the national curriculum have led to some confusion. Getting to and from school



Although the parent survey results last year were excellent, one of the areas that you felt that we needed to work on was encouraging

healthy lifestyles. As part of our continued work to develop similar messages at home and at school, we are encouraging parents to let their children walk or ride to school each day. Although there are sometimes fully understandable reasons why students might require a lift, as most of our families live within a 1.5 Km radius of the school, we think it is reasonable to think that they could make their way independently. There are lots of encouraging and informative websites out there to support this cause.

This is an extract from the BBC website:

Walking to school

Walking is a great way to get to school - it's healthy, free and doesn't create pollution. It also reduces traffic congestion during the 'school run'. Walking to school also gives older children independence. Once they know their route and can cross roads safely, they can walk by themselves or with friends. Reducing the number of cars around a school, reduces the risk of injury to pedestrians.

Cycling to school

Cycling is another great way to get to school. If your child cycles to school, make sure their bike is in good working order, and that they wear a helmet and reflective jacket. Work out the best route, with the least traffic. Find out about cycle training, which should be provided free by your local authority. There is advice about training at, http://

Driving to school (to be avoided if possible)

If walking or cycling aren't possible, there are several ways of getting to school by road:

- public transport
- car-sharing
- family car

Driving your child to school with empty seats in your car is the least environmentally-friendly way to get them to school. However, it's still the way many kids get to school. If this is your situation, it's worth taking some time to see if you could organise it any other way, at least on some days. Lift sharing and buses really do reduce the numbers of vehicles on the road.

Travel tips for secondary pupils

- If you are worried about safety, practise your child's journey with them before they start secondary school.
- Make sure your child is aware of potential danger points - looking carefully before crossing busy roads, taking extra care at bus stops and getting on and off trains.
- Make sure your child avoids the use of mobile phones whilst crossing roads.
- Talk with your child about what they should do if they felt threatened, e.g. if they felt an adult was following them or behaving oddly on public transport.




