From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers,

I have been talking to the whole school about 'British values' through year assemblies this week. It is actually a government requirement that all schools promote the values of:

- Freedom
- Tolerance
- Democracy
- The rule of law

These are fundamental values that we should cherish as Nobelians. I also made connections between the values, to help our young people grasp how one value leads to another. For example, that our individual freedom cannot be unlimited as it might impinge on the freedom of others: accepting alternative views and being tolerant of others is vital, so long as those views are within the law. I would like our whole school community to emphasise these values, and would therefore encourage you to discuss them at home. If we were to have an inspection, Ofsted as the government agency that monitors schools, would want to see that we both promote British values and challenge behaviour that threatens them. Raising Road Awareness at Stevenage Fire Station

Sixth Form students recently visited Stevenage fire station to take part in Road Awareness Training (RATs) as part of their enrichment programme. RATs is an education package delivered by the fire service designed to be delivered to new and learner drivers.

The purpose of the programme is to educate young people on the dangers of driving and road traffic accidents, including the consequences to themselves and to others if they cause or are involved in a collision. By addressing the dangers to students before they get on the road, and in their first year of driving, it is hoped to significantly reduce accidents and make the roads safer for everyone.

The students were given a presentation by the fire crew on road safety and the importance of taking responsibility for their actions as drivers and passengers. A tour of the fire station followed and they were shown around the fire engines and given a demonstration of the tools used to cut people from vehicles involved in collisions. The students were then dressed in protective clothing so that they could take part in a real life scenario. The drill involved some of the students sitting in a vehicle to replicate a road traffic accident while other students used the cutting equipment to cut them from the vehicle with the fire crew's guidance. Students said that their favourite part of the visit was when they sat in a simulator car which transmitted the noises and smoke you would encounter in serious collision into the vehicle.

The whole experience was invaluable to our new and learner drivers and Nobel would like to thank Richie and the crew at the Stevenage fire station for giving us their time and

experience so that our students are safe on the roads.

Lord Speaker's Peers in schools event at The Nobel School

The Nobel School hosted a talk by Lord Balfe, a member of the House of Lords on Friday 25 November to encourage students to become more engaged with the political and parliamentary process. Lord Balfe met with our Year 12 Sixth Form students and talked about the work and role of the House of Lords. This was followed by a lively question and answer session covering various aspects of parliamentary process and life at Westminster generally.

Lord Balfe summarised his 25 year career as an MEP, gave a current insight into Brexit and described the 6 years he spent working for the former Prime Minister, David Cameron and the trade unions.

Martyn Henson, headteacher, said, "This was a fantastic opportunity for our students to interact with someone who knows the parliamentary system inside out, as it can sometimes seem far removed from their daily lives. It is also important for our students to understand the effect Brexit may have on their futures".

The visit was arranged via the Lord Speaker's "Peers in Schools" programme, which has been running across the UK since 2007 and has so far involved around 75,000 young people. This continuing outreach programme sends members of the House of Lords into schools, academies and colleges across the country to give talks in support of the citizenship curriculum.

Nobelian Ethan Walsh was recently picked to represent England at table tennis in the Cadet Boys category, winning 2 out of his 3 matches by beating Ziga Zigon of Slovenia 3-2, followed by a 3-1 victory over Adam Klaber of Slovakia, resulting in Ethan qualifying for the knockout stages. In Ethan's final singles match, he was pitted against Amin Ahmadian of Iran (ranked 28th in the world) - a great match which Ethan eventually lost 3-1.

In the doubles, Ethan was paired with Ilia Kortchinski of Belarus and despite not having . played together previously, in their opening match the pair managed a 3-2 win over Marc Gutierrez and Miguel Nunez of Spain. Thereafter, they had a great run and got through to the last 16, where they came up against a strong pair from Hungary and lost 3-1 – what great results overall, though!

We are likely to hear more from Ethan in the near future, as he hopes to be selected by England for the Spanish and Swedish Youth Open, as well as the Six Nations next year – good luck from all of us, Ethan!

Nobel Chair of Governors wins Hertfordshire Outstanding School Governor Award 2016

The Nobel School in Stevenage is delighted that one of its co-chairs of Governors, Richard Aggus, was chosen as one of the two winners of the Hertfordshire Association of School Governors (HASG) Outstanding School Governor Awards 2016.

The award was presented by HCC Cabinet Member for Enterprise, Education and Skills Councillor David Williams and HASG Chair Michael Scandrett at the Annual Governor Conference on 19th November.

The HASG nomination statement read:

Richard has been a governor [since] 18 October 1999, has taken on every major role and was appointed Chair in 2011. He has been an exceptional, well respected governor going above and beyond without hesitation. From the outset he was instrumental in the recruitment of a new headteacher, reforming the governing body and raising then to "Good".

Three years ago, the school moved into a brand new building following a BSF programme. Richard worked diligently throughout the process, making a significant contribution to our amazing new school.

The school is considering changing its status and Richard has displayed exceptional commitment, ensuring that every step of the process is carried out efficiently and in line with legal and moral guidance. He spent a tremendous amount of time researching the legal implications, attending meetings with stakeholders, and leading governor working parties. In the governors' unanimous opinion, Richard's individual contribution to this process has been outstanding. His diligence and commitment have ensured that the conversion goes as smoothly as possible and reaches a successful outcome. Richard is an excellent Chair, who brings clear understanding with insightful contributions to meetings. He can be relied upon to ask critical questions that support teaching and learning and the management of the school. With his experience of the HfL governance team, he has carried out a full audit of the governing body ensuring they have the right skills, training and knowledge to fulfil their roles effectively and help carry Nobel forward to being an outstanding school.

Richard Aggus said: It is always special to win an award, but even more so when the nomination comes from your own colleagues and has been judged by your peers against worthy submissions from schools across Hertfordshire. I would like to thank my colleagues for submitting the nomination and both HASG and Herts for Learning (HfL) for their commitment to this award and to supporting governors across Hertfordshire.

Hertfordshire has over 7000 school governors who give up their time to carry out a vital role in schools. The role is often undervalued, but evidence shows that a committed governing body working alongside an equally committed Leadership team leads to an outstanding school in all aspects. I would encourage everyone to think about becoming a school governor and giving schools the benefit of the skills you have so that our young people are educated in the very best schools.



Debating matters

This year's qualifying round of the *Debating Matters* competition for sixth formers took place at Queens' School, Bushey on Thursday, 10 November. This is a very challenging national competition that allows sixth form students to debate controversial current topics. Nobel's teams consisted of Chloe Stout and Jordan Dutt arguing "There should be no limits on free speech in social media" and Jasmine Adom and Shelley Lloyd arguing against the motion "The social freezing of eggs empowers women".

With support from Dara Aluko, Larreisha Zealand, Julia Masters and Dominika Borkowska in preparing for the debates, the students all put on a highly professional performance against some extremely strong opposition. Chloe and Jordan won the first debate and Jasmine and Shelley were unfortunately beaten by the host school. All of the students proved themselves to be excellent at researching a wide range of information and their debating skills improved enormously over the course of the weeks leading up to the competition. We are very proud of all of the students who committed themselves to this competition and who debated so expertly on the night.

MFL and Humanities work together

Mercredi dernier, les étudiants en classe 7 HWE ont eu une classe de français avec une différence - ils ont eu un cours de géographie tout en français! Ils ont travaillé en groupes et ils ont appris les aspects humains et physiques de géographie de six pays francophones - La Suisse, La Belgique, La France, La Côte d'Ivoire, Le Cameroun et Le Canada. Chaque étudiant avait un rôle spécial, et pour commencer les groupes ont fait des recherches pour faire un poster en français au sujet de leur pays. Puis chaque groupe a fait une présentation à la classe sur leur pays en français, en donnant des informations clefs du pays, par exemple la population et la religion (géographie humaine), les montagnes et les rivières (physique) et où le pays se trouve dans le monde (cartographie).

La classe a été enseignée par Madame Swaile (Géographie) et Madame Kleanthous (Français) et les profs ont été impressionnées par la qualité du travail, l'entousiasme des étudiants et leur confiance à parler Français après seulement deux mois à Nobel! Last Wednesday, students from 7HWE had a French class with a difference - they learnt geography, with everything taught in French! They worked in groups and they learnt about the human and physical geography of six French-speaking countries - Switzerland, Belgium, France, Ivory Coast, Cameroon and Canada. Each student had a particular role, and to begin, students carried out research to make a poster about their country. Then each group made a presentation to the class about their country in French, informing us about key information, such as population and religion (human geography), mountains and rivers (physical) and the location (cartography).

The class was taught by Mrs Swaile (Geography) and Mrs Kleanthous (French) and the teachers were really impressed with the quality of their geography, and the enthusiasm of the students, especially their confidence in speaking and writing French after just two months at Nobel!

Mathematics has many real life applications and one problem in which it can be applied is the sweeping of the lines on a clay tennis court.



The further Mathematics students of year 13 (all 3 of us) are pleased to present our latest mathematics achievement!

Within the module of Decision 1 in A level maths we study the route inspection problem in which you have to travel across all of the lines (arcs) in a graph at least once. This is applied to the tennis court as all the lines had to be swept after a match of tennis was played. The connection was established in lesson time and it was given as homework to try and find the guickest way to sweep all the lines; we knew it was possible to solve this dilemma due to our studying of the route inspection problem. We decided to take a trip to Letchworth Tennis club in order to test our solutions. Due to unfortunate weather conditions, we did not play any tennis; however, the rain did briefly stop which allowed us onto the court to solve the problem. We had previously decided that the solution would be different depending on

which court you played on. We tested our theory for the court nearest the clubhouse where the line sweeper was approximately 2m from the edge of the court.

We had all solved the problem in seemingly different ways and therefore it was decided that we would all set off at the same time and walk along the lines to see if each solution was the 'shortest' way to sweep all of the lines. We all believed our way was the best and you could sense the competition between us all. As we came to the end it became clear that all methods were equal in length - if Mr Mynott could read his map properly - and therefore we had solved the problem (my solution above). This is proof that when mathematicians put their minds to a problem it can be solved and beneficial to all. Well, those who need to sweep the lines of a tennis court anyway.
