### From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers

Mr David Martin, assistant head and science teacher at the school, told me a story that warmed the cockles of my heart earlier in the week. David was travelling by train to London Kings Cross with his wife and some friends last Saturday to see a concert at Wembley Stadium why anyone would want to see Ed Sheeran is beyond me but, nevertheless, I thought I would about а small, but verv significant incident that happened on their journey.

David and his friends got on the train at Welwyn North and noticed a year 11 student in the same carriage. I won't name the young man for fear of embarrassing him, but he greeted Mr Martin, asked him if he was doing anything nice and said it was good to see him - lovely, but it gets better! When the young man got up to leave the train at Hatfield, he hung back from the group he was with, leant forward, looked Mr. Martin in the eye, shook his hand firmly and wished him a lovely weekend. Mr Martin's friends who both work in the City, one as an accountant and one, interestingly, in HR, were 'gobsmacked'. They were clear that the polite and courteous behaviour was not something that candidates - all ages - necessarily displayed on job interview. They were amazed that a year 11 student should have the confidence, poise and wherewithal to behave in such a manner towards one of his teachers at the weekend.

Mr Martin told me that this had made him feel proud to be a Nobelian and, for what it's worth, I think we should all feel the same. It reminds us once again that examination results are important and will get you an interview, but the way you carry yourself and how people perceive you will get you the job. I wish I could name the young man, but he knows who he is and that's the most important thing. When I talk to students in assembly about being good Nobelians, this is what I mean.

I know that our term dates this year caused some consternation and I have addressed the reason for this in a previous edition of Nobel News. However, I should like to give you early notification of our important dates for next academic year. They are published elsewhere in this edition of Nobel News, but you will be pleased to see that our dates are the same as other Stevenage and Hertfordshire schools, although disappointingly different to London – my wife and two young children will have a different October half-term to me! We will also send these dates home by e-mail.

Finally, examinations are over and now we start to prepare for next year. Colleagues will be working on planning for next year, adjusting and honing schemes of work as well as inducting new members of staff. At the same time, we will be welcoming our new students to Nobel with various transition activities. One group finishes as the next one starts, that's schools for you and some of us have done it 33 times now!

Enjoy the sun and fingers crossed for England on Sunday.



### **Nobel thinks**

On Monday 18 June, Branko Bjelobaba came into school to talk to our students about the following topic area:

"Grit and determination will get you everywhere"

Branko has three areas of specialism – finance, motivation and democracy. He has worked in the insurance industry for 30 years and has worked extensively across the sector – for a regulator, PwC, Aviva and a large broker. He has run his own consultancy business for the last 14 years.

The students really listened carefully to what Branko had to say and he talked about how important it is to succeed in one's academic qualifications, but also that it is very important to get alternative experiences such as volunteering and work experience.



If one does not succeed in education there are other routes into the job world such as apprenticeships and setting up one's own business. He did stress that it is critical to take any opportunities that come your way and make the most of them, including your qualifications.

# **Girls in Engineering - 2**

Since I was 14, when I started a 2-year GCSE Engineering course, I always knew that I wanted to have a career in the engineering industry. As well as gaining knowledge about engineering through the subject, as part of my studies, I had the opportunity to visit places such as Vauxhall in Luton to get a better insight into what engineering was like in a real-world setting.

In 2015, I secured my first ever work placement at Airbus Defence and Space and I really enjoyed my experience there so, at the end of Year 11, I applied for a place on their Engineering Apprenticeship Programme but, unfortunately, I was rejected at the final stage of the apprenticeship selection process.

Although I was disappointed, I decided instead to continue my education at Sixth Form and thought about university as an option. However soon after starting my A' levels I realised that I really wanted to do an apprenticeship and that university wasn't the right pathway for me.

At the end of Year 12 I did another placement at Airbus and. after visiting each of the departments and speaking to lots of people in various different roles, I knew that this was where I wanted to be. So, during Year 13, I reapplied for the Engineering Apprenticeship at Airbus Defence and Space as well as a few other companies and, after a very lengthy selection process, I completed the final interview and was offered a place on their apprenticeship programme!

I was over the moon knowing I had finally achieved my goal and that all the effort, hard work, perseverance and determination had paid off. I am very excited to be starting my apprenticeship in September and, if the past two years have taught me anything, it is to never give up on your dreams.

# **Proposed French Visit**

The MFL Team are planning a visit to Northern France close to Saint-Omer on the Opal Coast for all students in years 7, 8, 9 and 10 who are studying French.

This will be a 3-day visit and will take place between 18-20 October 2018

The best place to gain real understanding of a language is in the country where it is spoken. This visit will therefore be an excellent opportunity for your child to gain some intensive and focused exposure to the language and culture which, from our own experiences, we believe will be invaluable for them. The language study visit to northern France gives students the opportunity to improve their fluency, confidence and understanding of the language at the same time as gaining knowledge of another country's culture, experiencing new surroundings, meeting new people and gaining invaluable experience abroad. It is therefore both an educational and cultural experience.

The final price of the 3-day trip will be dependent upon the number of students who enrol, but it is estimated that the total cost will be around £225 per student.

This will include return travel from the school to France via coach and ferry, accommodation with full board for 2 nights at a 19<sup>th</sup> century French château, and all activities and excursions as well as the services of a French-speaking assistant.

Activities that will be offered to students in France will be exciting, cultural and will encourage the use of French. They include things like a chocolate workshop, crêpe making, visiting a local town, cooking a local dish, visiting a snail farm, snail tasting and visiting a local marine centre.

During their time in France students will be encouraged to read, listen to, speak and write French as much as possible.

If you would like further information about this visit, please call in to the main reception and pick up a letter.

A further trip will be offered later in the year for our students studying German.

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### **Logic Puzzle solution**

It would take 4 minutes and 48 seconds. In 1 minute Bob washes 1/8 of the car and Joe washes 1/12 of the car. This makes 3/24ths and 2/24ths of the car washed, or a total of 5/24ths. Therefore the number of minutes taken for a whole car is 24/5, or 4.8 minutes.
