
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From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers,

Those of you who have attended the school open evening over the last three years will know that when I speak to prospective parents I always stress to them that what we are trying to achieve as a school is quite simple — excellent examination results coupled with well-rounded young people who are fully prepared to meet the challenges of the changing world. This is the 'equation' I share with students, staff, governors and parents:



Our core principles are based around what we call our 'fundamentals'- these are the simple things that we have to get right before we can guarantee 'progress for all students'. In a sense, my role as headteacher is ensure that we provide the very best teaching and learning and our job, in partnership between school and home, is make sure that:

'Nobelians will be equipped to make informed choices, be responsible citizens, enjoy successful careers and achieve personal fulfilment'.

I should like to draw your attention this week to two important 'fundamentals' – uniform and attendance.



Uniform

We have a very smart and simple school uniform that represents two things:

Firstly, it shows that students 'mean business' when they come to school; staff are encouraged to dress smartly for school for the same reasons. Coming to school is different to evenings and weekends.

Secondly, by wearing our uniform and dressing smartly it demonstrates that we are proud to be part of this lovely school.

May I therefore ask you to keep an eye on common uniform transgressions:

- Blazers are to be worn at all times.
- Blazer sleeves are not to be 'rolled up'.
- Shirts are tucked in at all times.
- Top buttons are to be fastened at all times.
- Flat black shoes are to be worn, no trainers or boots.

We are a very smart school and we are absolutely determined to maintain this.

Attendance

Our school attendance figure so far this term has been excellent – over 96%, and last year it was 95.5%. We need to maintain these high levels, as good attendance is intrinsically linked to academic progress. Please consider the following:

- Avoid taking your children on holiday during term time.
- Whenever possible, send your child to school – obviously keep them off if they are infectious or they have a temperature. Colds and sniffles can probably be endured at school.

As you know, we value your support enormously - a healthy partnership between home and school is vital as we all develop and progress. Thank you for your continued support.

Operation Christmas Child November 11 2015

It's that time of year again where we begin think about

those less fortunate than ourselves at Christmas time. Operation Christmas child is a charity which is now the UK's largest children's Christmas appeal. The idea is simple. Children and adults wrap and pack shoeboxes with a range of gifts both big and small, which will be collected in tutor groups across the school.

Last Christmas, a total of 977, 880 children from 15 countries across the world received a special shoebox gift thanks to the commitment of supporters and volunteers across the UK. Here at The Nobel School we collected a grand total of 447 shoe boxes; this year we have set ourselves a target to collect over 500 gift boxes. So what goes in your shoe box?

Donations are separated into four different categories (with boxes containing a variety of each): toys (soft toy, jigsaw, yo-yo); educational supplies (Felt pens, colouring book, pens, pencils, notepad); hygiene items (Toothbrush, toothpaste, hairbrush, soap) and other items (gloves, scarf, hat). Please remember all items should be new and don't forget to add in your £3 contribution to the postage of your package.

Christmas fayre Sunday 15 November

Sticking with the festive theme, Sunday 15
November will be our annual Nobel Christmas
Fayre. This year we hope to have a range of
festive stalls open throughout the day along with
a range of Christmas performances, food and
drink, festive face-painting and Santa's grotto. If

Important information - Detentions

At The Nobel School we have a rigorous Behaviour for Learning policy that is built on the principal that all students have the right to learn. This policy consists of both rewards for consistently good and outstanding contributions, as well as sanctions when our school's expectations are not met.

Part of these sanctions includes the issuing of detentions, which we feel is a vital part of correcting behaviour that falls below our expectations. Furthermore, non-attendance at these detentions is taken very seriously.

Therefore, should students fail to attend three detentions they will serve one day in reflection. If they fail to attend three more detentions they will serve a further day in reflection. If they then fail to attend a further three detentions, totalling nine, they will serve a one day fixed term exclusion. Students are told in each lesson and form time if they have a detention on that day and lists of detainees are posted in three places around the school, so that students are fully aware of any detentions they might have.

Working together in the best interests of all Nobelians

We are a big school, with over 1,500 students, and we need to ask for your support with the following to minimise disruption at our reception.

Reception is not able to take forgotten PE kits, planners, homework, food ingredients, money, packed lunch or other such items to students in their classrooms. Parents are, of course, welcome to bring in forgotten items that their children may collect from reception during their break/lunch time.

Similarly, reception is no longer able to call home for forgotten PE kits, planners, homework or food ingredients. We will, however, call home to ask parents for forgotten lunches and dinner money, which the students may collect from reception.

We ask that you encourage your child to drink more water, so as to minimise the chance of them dehydrating which can cause headaches (the school does not distribute aspirin, paracetemol or any other form of painkiller). In order to avoid your child being late for any medical or dental appointments scheduled during school hours, please kindly ensure your child knows what time they are to meet you at reception - it is their responsibility to meet you on time. In cases of emergency, reception will of course go and collect your child on your behalf. If your child becomes unwell whilst at school, one of our first aiders will assess them and contact you if they feel your child should go home.

Finally, and in an effort to help save you money, we ask that you label all your child's belongings, as any lost property handed in at reception that is named will be given back to that student. Should your child lose anything, please ask them to first check the classrooms they had lessons in that day and the black bins in the PE department before asking at reception.

Library News

What the Library offers students at Nobel.

Every student in Years 7-9 can borrow two books and take them home for two weeks. We have a wide selection of both fiction and non-fiction to choose from and have a suggestions book for students to request any titles we don't have and that they would like us to get. We regularly buy new books and keep up to date with the latest publications.

The library also has a range of magazines, newspapers, graphic novels and leisure reads.

Art Design and Technology news...

Staffing

This September has been a huge change for the whole of the ADT Faculty with the retirement of two long-serving staff resulting in new additions to the staffing team, Joseph James and Jasvinder Jutla. Courtney Grieve in year 12 said 'I enjoyed the experience, what a great source of inspiration for my coursework.'




