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From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers,

I hope you all had a good half-term and that your children were looking forward to coming back to school; any teacher in the country will tell you that as the nights draw in and the clocks go back, the next half-term can be most challenging in the school year. However, I can report that both students and staff have returned to school full of enthusiasm, energy and hope. We are really looking forward to another very successful academic year and the early indications are that we should surpass our record breaking examination results from last summer. Our latest year 11 'data-drop', where teachers, through assessment, indicate what students will achieve in their examinations, was most encouraging. Students across the ability range are making significant progress - there is a really serious and determined atmosphere in school and, with your support, I'm absolutely sure they will fulfill their expectations and more. However, may I remind everyone that the biggest restricting factor is a 'fear of failure' - a mindset that says 'I can't do that!' This attitude needs to be challenged by all of us, all the time. Getting things wrong, making mistakes and taking risks is what proper education is really about. I want you to encourage your children to ask questions and develop their own point of view; being successful in the 21st century will be as much about 'character' as it is about examination results - with a positive mindset and by working together, we can achieve both.



On Tuesday afternoon we welcomed two teachers from Shanghai, Ms Peizhen Wang and Mr Xiaobao Wu, they are spending a month at our school working specifically with our mathematics faculty and more generally with other teachers in Stevenage, Hertfordshire and beyond. As you may be aware, Shanghai province in China enjoys the very best mathematics results in the world therefore their skills and knowledge will be absolutely invaluable as we challenge all of our young people to succeed in mathematics. We are very privileged to have Mr. Wu and Ms. Wang as our guests and we will report in much more detail about their visit in a future edition of 'Nobel News'.

Finally, can I remind you that our Sixth Form Open Evening will take place on Wednesday 11 November starting at 6pm. This is an absolutely vital evening for students and parents as it marks the start of process of information, advice and guidance that all of our year 11 students will be receiving over the next few months. We really do think that our Sixth Form is the best place for the vast majority of our graduating year 11s; please come along and see what we have to offer and if you have friends or neighbours with youngsters in year 11 at other schools – spread the word!


New and retired teachers' from Nobel school

The idea of the book was devised by a brother and sister team. Joe, an Art/DT teacher at The Nobel School in Stevenage and has a degree in Art and Design, wrote the majority of the story and provided the illustrations. Katie, an English teacher at Harlington Upper in Bedford, conceived the original premise of utilising the collective nouns of animals, as well as contributing to the story.

Pickles is an inquisitive young pug who embarks on a journey of discovery. On unhappily finding that his family are collectively known as 'a litter of pups', Pickles sets out to find an alternative moniker, meeting many new friends along the way. The young pup discovers creatures of all shapes and sizes, before finally returning back home to his 'pack of dogs' wiser and contented.



The book is coupled with some exciting wordplay courtesy of existing collective nouns found within the English language, along with some bright and eye catching artwork that playfully represent those nouns. The story is aimed at 3-7 year olds and retails at £3.95.




Book corner

SST TRIP TO WESTMINSTER

On 28 September, Stephen McPartland (MP for Stevenage) sponsored a trip for SST members to visit the Houses of Parliament. Through an in-depth tour of the building, we were able to learn a lot about the history of the architecture and of the artwork on display. It was fascinating to see just how many paintings and sculptures there were and even more fascinating to learn that when the rooms were designed there were meant to be even more pieces of art on display. However, due to the length of time needed to paint, and perhaps in part due to money shortages, many rooms which had spaces intended for paintings of British military victories or of scenes from King Arthur had to be instead filled with portraits of the royal family, which is not to say that they were less impressive.

Another interesting part of the tour was just how many rules there were about where you could and could not sit. It was tempting to sit down in the House of Commons and pretend for a minute that you were an MP, not helped by part of the tour taking place between the bench rows, but it was forbidden to do so, even though no actual MPs were present. While we were there, a class of primary school children were being toured and they were humorously made to kneel between the bench rows to rest their feet and to avoid sitting on the benches. With several tours happening at the same time, it was no wonder why the places where you could sit down were so full. Regardless, it was amusing to be able to enter the House of Commons, a room where the Queen would not be able to enter.

In the end, it was an enriching trip where we could immerse ourselves into an important part of British history and learn more about the workings of modern politics.

'Teechers' By John Godber

The hysterical, yet touching, classroom comedy.

IN a comical end-of-term play, three Year 11 students enthusiastically bring to life their new drama teacher's progress through two terms of: rowdy classes, pessimistic co-workers and an uncooperative caretaker. Disenchanted, Jeff Nixon leaves for the 'safe haven'



of a private school, and seemingly abandons his newly inspired students. 'Teechers' is a contemporary classic, with a vital message about education for the 'haves' and 'have nots'. Director Wendy Parsley (with help from a very talented cast) bought the 1980s tale bang up to date.

William Hextall's wide variety of facial expressions were very entertaining – with the grumpy caretaker being one of the many highlights from the show. Coral Willis produced a flirty performance as 'bouncy' PE teacher Miss Prime, which contrasted wonderfully with Megan Dowler's quirky portrayal of 'Am-Dram' loving Head Teacher Mrs Parry.

Alex Sabine and Jordan Dutt had the very hard task of giving a new interpretation on the well-known characters of Oggy Moxon and Deputy Head Mr Basford. Both actors were a treat for the audience to watch, with much laughter and gritting of teeth being had.

Personality was added through the witty main characters of Salty, Gail and Hobby; played wonderfully by Ashley Woolhead, Laura Clarke and Lucy Rodgers. A real comradery was shown on stage between these actors, with Godber's snappy lines being delivered with confidence and ease.


