#### From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers,

How about this as a headline?

'Nobelian scores to help defeat FC Barcelona'

Unlikely as this may seem, this actually happened on Sunday 8 May at Stadium MK. Two of our students - John Freeman in Year 9 (playing in the age group above) and Leon Taylor in Year 10 - both played significant roles in defeating the Catalan giants 3 – 0. Leon, a right back, scored in the first half and John, who came on at half-time played a blinder at left back (he usually plays in midfield). Both boys, who started their MK careers at under 9 level having been 'scouted' playing locally, acquitted themselves really well and proved fantastic ambassadors for our lovely school. #### Primary collaboration update.

As part of our work to forge stronger links with our local primary schools, I have been working closely with Year 5 and 6 teachers across the town to establish areas where Nobel School can assist in the teaching of KS2 subjects. Throughout this academic year we have hosted Year 5 and 6 classes in our Science Faculty to allow the students to have a hands-on experience of secondary science lessons. We have now taken this working relationship a step further by using a session to deliver learning specific to the topics being taught at Key Stage 2.

On Wednesday 4 May, 55 Year 5 students from Martins Wood Primary School came to Nobel to look at some reversible and irreversible chemical reactions, in support of their current "No Way Back" topic. During the lesson, the students carried out an investigation into two different reactions, which demonstrated a reversible change and an irreversible change. There was much excitement in the laboratory, as the students were given the opportunity to use Bunsen burners for the first time. They will take their results back to Martins Wood and use them in their upcoming classwork.

Mr Walker, Year 5 Teacher, said "I just wanted to say another big thank you for allowing us to visit your labs on Wednesday. Your demonstration has really given us a focus as we launch into our new topic!"

I am very much looking forward to running many more of these sessions in the future, as we continue to strengthen our links with the local primary schools. David has also been heavily involved in the creation and running of the Premier league and Vice-Chairman of the Football Association.

Around one hundred year 9 and 10 students took the opportunity to hear David speak about the trials and tribulations of creating the premier league, as well as the lessons he learnt from working with excellent athletes and football managers. He linked the lessons he has learnt to the day-to-day learning that our students undertake in school, and how in order to be successful you need to have in mind an image of what you would consider being successful as being.

At the end of the talk, both the staff and students asked some excellent questions, ranging from did he think it was time for Arsene Wenger to step down, to who was his biggest mistake to not sign. He explained how it is important for students to study and work hard if they want to succeed in the future; hopefully this is a message that our students can take on board for their own futures.

#### Year 11 news...

As exam season is upon us, students and staff alike have been working incredibly hard to ensure that students achieve the grades they deserve.

There have been multiple interventions taking place behind the scenes to ensure year 11 are progressing as they should:

- Some year 11 students have been given mentors to guide them through these final few weeks and provide support
- Assemblies have been targeted to specific core subject revision as well as more general revision skills and tips.
- PSHCEE lessons and form times have been dedicated to personal study and revision time.
- Subject specific interventions continue to take place on a fortnightly rota.
- Mock results surgeries and small group teaching in core subjects has taken place to aid students' understanding of specific exam skills.
- Revision timetable templates have been issued and students have been shown how to revise effectively- including relaxation time- as advised by a recent study featured in *The* Guardian.
- Students were also invited to attend peer mentoring in English and Maths during their lunchtimes where students work together and teach each other as they make their way through past papers and revision guides.

On a non-academic basis I have been working very closely with the Junior Student team to arrange: personalised hoodies; Nobel yearbooks; the Year 11 Leavers' Assembly (28 June 11am), Prom (30 June) and the leavers' video (in fact students now head in the other direction when they see me with a camera!).

I want to take this opportunity to thank the JST for their amazing work this year, and a special mention to our Head Boy and Girl-Jordan Dutt and Rebecca Owen, who have been a fantastic support and have even assisted me leading staff training sessions on behaviour management. The entire team is a credit to their year group and the school.

#### Home Access to Eclipse.net

The school library system Eclipse is now available for students to access at home. 
