
From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers,

What's happening in ESS and IT

Firstly, we would like to welcome back Mrs Dennehy from her maternity leave after the birth of her daughter Orla. Mrs Dennehy returns as Head of Business Studies and Economics.

As a faculty we have spent the past few months preparing our students for their GCSE, A Level and BTEC courses. Our BTEC students are in the final process of completing their assignments and we are anticipating some excellent results across all our courses, both academic and vocational.

We will be launching a new suite of vocational courses across the faculty in September which will require us to develop closer links with local employers. These employers will be directly involved in delivering aspects of the curriculum. Mr Hamilton has been working closely with Glaxo Smith Klein's IT research and development department. They are developing opportunities for students to participate in real life ICT experiences in the corporate work place. Mrs Frost and Miss Amey are working with a local care home for the elderly to develop units of work relating to Health, Safety and Security and Infection Control in care homes.

Mr Bell also attended an Apprenticeship open evening for teachers at Glaxo Smith Klein which resulted in a group of Year 13 students attending an open evening for students, five of whom have made applications to the apprenticeship scheme.

Mr Hamilton recently visited Durrington High School in Sussex and spent the day looking at how they deliver their courses in Year 7, 8 and 9 to ensure that their students are "GCSE ready" at the start of Year 10. He returned full of ideas about how we can develop our courses at KS3 to engage students and increase the number of students opting for computing at GCSE. If anyone is interested in studying computing at GCSE they should start attending " Scratch Club" in September. "Scratch Club" is a lunchtime and after school club that runs on Mondays and Tuesdays and allows students the opportunity to produce their own game making programs. On Tuesdays, Mr Bell and Dr Finn are working with our most able computer scientists with some Raspberry Pi computers to explore a range of different programming languages. Staff from Wilmott Dixon, the construction firm, are supporting this activity.

The psychology students in Year 12 are currently studying "Mental Health Issues", investigating how the treatment of mental health has changed throughout history and getting to grips with how difficult it can be to diagnose mental illness.

We will be starting a KS3 Psychology Club in September which will be run by our Post 16 students with support from staff. Topics that the club will cover include: improving your memory; visual illusions; altruism; the reasons behind criminal behaviour and nonverbal communication.

We will be welcoming the following new members of staff to the Faculty in September.

Miss Zloh will be teaching Psychology and Sociology

Mr Gopaul will be teaching Psychology and Sociology

Mrs Haggar will be teaching ICT and Computing

Mrs Taunton will be teaching Business Studies

Finally, we will be saying goodbye to Mr Dalal and Mr McCleish who are moving on to pastures new.




