From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers,

It has been a really challenging time for our country. The European Union referendum has created unrest and division – unfortunately, this is symptom of a process that requires a binary, yes/no response to a single question. When there is no room for compromise, we are forced to take sides and our language can become divisive and combative instead of tolerant and measured. However, the beauty of living in a democracy is that we accept the will of the majority and move on and I will be taking assemblies over the next couple of weeks stressing that our community and the atmosphere that we have in our lovely school, will not be affected at all by the 'fall-out' from the referendum - set out below is a reminder of our school ethos.

We believe in a school culture where:

we value everyone, embracing diversity.

we work together, learning from each other by sharing ideas.

we take responsibility for our own actions.

we push the boundaries of achievement and challenge ourselves to improve.

we measure and monitor our performance and have clear measurable targets.

we encourage and support all types of enrichment activities.

I was shocked and disappointed to read reports that elsewhere in the country some people were being told to 'go home' and told that they are not welcome anymore. Whatever happens, we must not get involved in such behaviour. It is fundamental to being a true Nobelian that 'we value everyone, embracing diversity' and it is during turbulent times that we must do our best to adhere to these essential principles.

On a specific school level, I can report that with less than three weeks of the academic year left, we have had another fabulous year. I should



like to take this opportunity to thank all the wonderful people that work in this very special school. Our teachers continue to operate over and above expectations as they work with each other to improve the learning of our students but also provide Nobelians with extra -curricular opportunities that build character and resilience. I should also like to thank all the support staff including Engie and Edwards Blake staff, who work tirelessly, often behind the scenes, to help us be the best we can possibly be as we strive for 'Excellence in Everything'. We will be fully staffed again in September as our recruitment procedures continue to buck the national trend of teacher shortages - by and large, people like working here!

Computing news...

A group of year 9 computing students, helped by Dr Finn and me have been working with a team of IT staff from Wilmott Dixon to gain experience with Raspberry Pi computers. These pocket-sized computers can do most of the things that a standard computer can but need more specialist commands to be learned before you can use them. In the first four weeks of the course the students have progressed from learning the basic commands that operate the computer to starting 3-D graphics programming in a Minecraft environment. The first programming work used Scratch, where blocks are put together to build up a program. This is usually used to build games but our students were set a number of maths challenges that they all solved in different ways to get the right result. The next session moved on to use Python. where students now had to type in their programs instead of building blocks of code. This is the main programming language used in schools and is a skill that will be useful as the students start to tackle the Computer Science GCSE next term. They created 2-D graphics programs in Python and in the most recent session moved on to 3-D graphics.

As this is the first time that Wilmott Dixon have delivered this material it was hard to guess how the students would get on with the course. As it can be hard to get the students to leave after some sessions it is clear that it is an enjoyable and engaging topic!

In the remaining three sessions the students will choose a project to showcase their new skills, possibly with a building theme suggested by the Wilmott Dixon team.

On Friday 24 June 2016 we went to MBDA headquarters in Stevenage with Mrs Townhill, together with our newly made robot/buggy to take part in the preliminary event of the Robot Rumble. We managed to achieve 7th place out of 16 groups with our guickest time of 11.86 seconds in the Obstacle Course. This earned us 10 Robot Rumble Stars to take forward to the intermediate event in October 2016. During the three attempts at the obstacle course, we made some changes to our design (such as, a wheel change as well as some assistance with our programing skills). About half way through the event our Bluetooth keys were not responding correctly so we improvised and used the data cable to run the robot.

Seb: "I absolutely loved the day! It was so scary for the first hour or two I was so worried we'd not be prepared but I soon realised I was loving it. When I saw people not understanding some of the programing, I helped! It was awesome."

Matt: "I loved the challenges we had to overcome. The fact that we got our robot moving was a nice thing to see, since we had issues previously with the programing, therefore when we got it moving correctly, I was ecstatic! I can't wait until the future events, but also developing our design and improving it. All in all, it was an amazing day!"

Jamie: "I loved the experience. At first I thought that we would not be ready because of the program, it wasn't working correctly. We got back on track and came 7th! I am very excited for the future events – October and December 2016."

Dear Parents and Carers,

You might have seen in the news that some teachers will be taking industrial action on 5 July 2016. The strike is about the level of funding schools receive, teachers' terms and conditions and teacher workload. The argument is not with Nobel or with the local authority employers, but our school will be affected by the strike.

Some of our teachers will be taking strike action on 5 July 2016, others will be working normally. We will not be able to guarantee the safety of all of our children on that day, and we will need to close the school to some year groups that will not be properly supervised.

The following year groups will not be sufficiently supported and you will need to make other arrangements for your child on that day. Do not send your child to school if he/she is in one of these year groups: 7, 8 and 9.

The year 11-12 induction day will take place as scheduled. Any year 11 student not listed to attend the induction day or year 12 student not listed as assisting should not be sent to school.

The year 10 English exam (all year 10s) will take place as scheduled on Tuesday morning.

The start time for the year 10 exams scheduled for Tuesday afternoon (namely engineering, Mandarin, sociology, dance and PE exams) will be brought forward to midday (all year 10 students with an afternoon exam must remain in school between exams). All year 10 students should wear uniform whilst in school.

I know that making alternative arrangements for your children will be difficult for some parents. That is why we are giving as much notice as possible and running as many classes/events as we can safely.

Please do not hesitate to contact the school if you need further clarification. I'm sure that we will quickly get back to normal on Wednesday.

Biomedical scientist is winning career for The Nobel School

Health Education England (HEE) is delighted to announce that students from The Nobel School are the East of England winners of the *Step into the NHS* national schools' competition.

Students Molly Cave and Roshni Dholakia impressed the judges with their entry to promote the role of a biomedical scientist to their peers. The girls created a great video which allowed students to better understand what a biomedical scientist does on a day-to-day basis.

Now in its eighth year, the competition attracted numerous entries from up and down the country and more than 3,000 students got involved. The competition aims to promote the 350 plus careers available in health and students were tasked with designing an advertisement and job description for their chosen role. They could work individually or in groups of up to four.

Miss Pearson said: "We are thrilled that our students have won this important prize. This competition has proven to be a valuable classroom tool, engaging students with the workings of the health service and the different career options available to them. The hard work and effort invested in their project reflects their commitment and dedication."

Roshni said: "We picked the job role of a biomedical scientist because we did a quiz on which career would suit us most and we both got biomedical scientist on the top of our list. The NHS competition was a wonderful experience and we learnt a lot about biomedical scientists and other jobs in the NHS too."

Molly added: "We really enjoyed taking part in the competition and are now more aware of the wide variety of careers available in the NHS. The competition has made us aware of what qualifications and skills are needed for certain roles in health and has definitely got me interested in a job in the NHS in the future."

Sarah Marcello, Strategic development manager for Health Education England in the East of England, said: "I'd like to congratulate Molly Cave, Roshni Dholakia and The Nobel School for their fantastic entry. Young people are extremely important to the future of the NHS workforce. It is important that the NHS engages with young people now and lets them know about the wealth of career opportunities.

"There are 350 different careers to choose from in health and jobs range from community matron, dietician or public health analyst to a finance manager or web developer. Initiatives such as the schools competition really help to raise awareness of this."




