From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers

Students and staff have returned to school after the Easter break in great spirits and ready for the challenges of the summer term. A full programme of support and interventions are in place for our Year 11 and Year 13 students as we move quickly into the examination season. Many Nobelians came in over the holidays to work with staff on and revision. ľm preparation impressed with the unbelievable commitment of our great staff who are so willing to give up 'holiday time' and weekends to support our students - thank you to the teachers and well done to students for coming in.

As you have appreciated our Easter holidays were different to other schools in Stevenage and I did receive a number of e-mails querying why the school had made these changes. In some quarters, it was even suggested that we changed the dates to suit my holiday arrangements! Far from it: in fact, my teacher wife and young children also had different holidays to Nobel. So, I thought, in the interests of being transparent, I would explain the rationale behind our term dates.

Two years ago, schools in Hertfordshire were given the chance to adjust the holiday dates with five 'occasional' days. We chose to shift the Easter holiday for the following reasons:

This would give students in examination groups an extra week in the run-up to examinations, time more usefully spent in school than at home – where teachers can supervise learning and revision.

- The original dates broke up on a Thursday, which would mean students would miss another Friday. Sixth formers have 4 lessons of one subject on a Friday. It was felt they would be penalised – for this reason, we tried to always break up on Fridays and return on Mondays.
- By including Good Friday (a bank holiday) into the Easter holiday enabled us to extend the Christmas holiday to January 8.

I totally understand that the ability for schools to set their own holidays causes issues for our families and I am sorry for any inconvenience caused; however, I do need to warn you that this is likely to continue – one local primary school has opted to take a two week break at the end of May.

In future, in order to minimise this disruption, we will endeavour to work closely with our local primary schools so that our holiday dates are as close as possible. This will not always be the case so please check The Nobel School website for holiday dates before you book expensive holidays – there is so much variation that checking the Hertfordshire CC or any other website will not give you the accurate information you need.

As a final point, please take care to check October half-term 2018. Nobel and all other Hertfordshire Schools will be taking the week beginning Monday 29 October, a week later than normal and, unfortunately, a week later than the London schools (my wife and children). Please be assured that we will only ever set holiday dates that best suit our students.

Enjoy a sunny weekend, time to mow the lawn!





Salters' Festival of Chemistry - University of Cambridge

The Salters' Festivals of Chemistry are an initiative of the Salters' Institute. Their objective is to help promote the appreciation of chemistry and related sciences among the young. Salters' Festivals provide the opportunity for enthusiastic young students (years 7/8) to spend a day in a university department and to take part in practical chemistry activities which are fun! Prizes are awarded to the winning teams and all students receive participation certificates and fun prizes. The top teams also win a prize for their school.

On Thursday 22 March a team representing Nobel comprising of Charlotte Hooper, Callum Hodgson, Samuel Hutchinson and Megan Walker-Kosak (year 8) went to the University of Cambridge competition. As a team, they had two practical challenges which tested their team working and skills in accuracy, precision and observation. The main focus of the morning is the "Salters' Challenge" set by the institute and in the afternoon students tackle "The University Challenge", which is a practical investigation chosen by the University. This was followed by a lecture 'It's a gas' which explained the chemistry and roles of the gases which make air combined with some spectacular, and at times explosive, demonstrations!


