## From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers

It's been a strange week. I've been working from home for the last three days recovering from a minor health issue (I'm fine and will be back raring to go next week!). It has given me some time to reflect on where we are as a school. We have had a very productive start to the year as we strive to develop further. I'm excited by the work we are doing in character development throughout the school, development of on-line an 'super curriculum' (ideas for students to do at home with friends and parents that will support their school work) and our quizzing approach to homework. Just three examples of where we continue to work on developing the whole Nobelian.

At the same time, I've been keeping up-to-date with a couple of really interesting and significant developments within education, one local, the other national.

Nationally, it was fascinating and refreshing to hear Amanda Spielman, Head of Ofsted, saying quite clearly that, in future, inspections will be more interested in the curriculum that schools offer rather than looking only at examination results – hooray! I hope that Ms Spielman wins this debate with the Department for Education, who have been driven by wanting to weigh success by school examination league tables.

Now, please don't think that we underplay results at Nobel, but what we have never done – and some schools definitely have – is enter students for examinations that benefit the school but are not right for the student. For us, the needs of individual students will always supersede the position of 'the school' in any league table.

Locally, I read, as you probably have, about the interest that two 'academy chains' are showing in taking over an existing school and building a new one in our town. It would appear that the decision has been made to build a new 'free school' on the old Collenswood School site. Isn't that strange? This is an area of the town that used to be served by three secondary schools, two of which have closed in the last 15 years because of falling numbers. The school that remains in that area is still not 'full'. academy chain in question will certainly bring a different approach and I guess that will give parents more 'choice'. It's not my place to make any further comment on this but, I do urge you to look out for the plans - they will profoundly change education provision in Stevenage.

Anyway, it's not for us to worry too much about other schools, our mission remains the same; to do the best by all the students who come through our lovely school.

## **Year 12 Work Experience**



My name is Sam Wiggins and I have recently been appointed Head Boy at Nobel school. I have been asked to share with you the amazing opportunity I was given during work experience week.

My work experience was with the managing director and founder of Smart Way Forward, Nadeem Shaikh. Smart Way forward is a training and development company, working in the sports and leisure industry delivering many kinds of training for example, management training, and customer service training, etc.



On the first day of my placement, I was able to visit and tour Lee Valley Athletic Centre, which is one of five high-performance athletic centres in the UK. While I was there, I met Ashleigh Nelson, a double World, European and Commonwealth medallist. I was able to see what happens when a competition is on and what happens with the athletes who train there when they are not competing.

On Tuesday, I went to Loughborough University, which hosts another of the five high-performance athletic centres in the UK. I also toured the Paula Radcliffe Stadium, meeting Harry Aikines-Aryeetey, Olympian, World, European and Commonwealth medallist, as well as George Gandy, head endurance coach at Loughborough University, who has coached many Olympic athletes and shared his amazing knowledge with me. I also visited Sports Park, which looks after the legal side of sport and where the majority of sports policies are made. At Sports Park I met Andy Reed OBE, former MP for Loughborough.



On Wednesday, I took a trip down to Olympic Park, Stratford, where I was lucky enough to tour three of the four major arenas – the Velodrome, Copper Box Arena and the Aquatic Centre. Due to the upcoming Anniversary Games taking place at the Olympic Stadium, I was unable to go inside; however, I still was able to have a look at the warm up track, used by all the athletes before their events.

On Thursday, I went to Allianz Park, the home of Shaftsbury Barnett Harriers, a First Division Athletics Club and also home of the Saracens Rugby Club and the biggest memorabilia collection in the world, owned by Nigel Wray. For example, the official London 2012 warm up track was moved inside the stadium. This meant I was able to see and understand what goes on behind the construction of a track and was shown how different materials and surfaces could impact an athlete's performance.

And finally, on Friday, I was lucky enough to assist Nadeem when commentating at the Golden Stag Mile, which took place in Finsbury Park. This was a great experience to see behind the scenes of a major open event, and I had to collect results from the time collectors and hand them to Nadeem so that he could announce them to the crowd.


## **Year 7 Team Building Trip to Wymondly Woods**


## **Year 12 Science Ambassadors**

During Sixth Form Induction in July we started this process of developing their post-18 vision and we have lots planned over this autumn term to support students make informed choices about further careers or study.

As part of our pastoral programme, we have provided all students with access to Unifrog. This place platform brings into one every undergraduate university course, apprenticeship, and college course in the UK, as well as other School opportunities, such as Leaver Programmes, MOOCs and every college at Oxford and Cambridge. This makes it easy for students to compare and choose the best university courses, apprenticeships or further education courses for them. They can also explore exciting opportunities further afield by looking at English-taught undergraduate programmes available in Europe and the USA. Please see the letter sent to parents regarding parent login so you can support their research and guide them in their decisions.

On Thursday 4 October, we held a workshop called the 'Hidden Job market' with 'Future First' for 30 of our Year 12 students who had expressed an interest in apprenticeships, jobs, marketing, business careers or the food sector. The session highlighted to the students the range of employment opportunities within a single business sector and how important it is, at this stage, to have an open mind and do your research. In addition, the Future First volunteers worked with our students on skills such as how to write formal letters of application, which may be used for work experience or employment.

After half term, during November, we will have workshops in conjunction University of Hertfordshire addressing next Steps after Sixth Form, employability skills and choosing courses at university.

On 26 September we held our first Parent Pit Stop of the academic year which focused on using Show My Homework and the School Gateway app.


Show My Homework enables you, as parents, to view all PLT (homework) set for your child and when it is due in.

To get started, all you need to do is click on the homework tab at the top of the home page of the school's website or visit **www.showmyhomework.co.uk** and search for The Nobel School, Mobbsbury Way. You can also download the free app from **Show My Homework** to your phone, tablet or i-Pad. This will allow you to receive notifications of homework set and the deadlines given.



Please note that if you or your child misplace or forget your login details you can still see the whole school PLT calendar by clicking on the Show My Homework tab at the top of the home page of the school's website. You can then filter by year group to find relevant PLT that has been set.

All students can access Show My Homework on the computers in school and are able to print out any sheets they need to complete PLT.

Many of the PLT tasks now being set for Year 7 and Year 10 make use of multiple choice quizzes to support students to regularly practise retrieving information in order to ensure that it is genuinely learned and not just retained for a few days. In order to complete SMHW quizzes students must be logged on or their score will not be saved.

If you require a new parental PIN then please contact me in school and I will be able to send you one.



## **Pupil Premium Update**

You may have heard in the news about some funding which is available to parents called Pupil Premium.

Just to clarify, the Nobel plan for pupil premium focuses on three main areas designed to support students, namely:

Preparing to learn
Academic attainment, achievement & progress
Enrichment

Funding will be allocated to students who qualify for pupil premium i.e. those who receive Free School Meals, (or have received Free School Meals in the last 6 years, referred to as Ever6), students in care, students who have been adopted or have special guardianship orders and those from families in active service with the armed forces.

If your child qualifies for pupil premium, we are able to support the costs of school trips/visits and school uniform. To make a claim for school uniform please send receipts into school in an envelope clearly marked with your child's name. Claims are reviewed by our school panel and in most cases we are able to offer a refund of up to 50%. Financial support for school trips should be discussed with our pupil premium coordinator, Mrs Julia Marshall.

If your home circumstances have changed, your child may be able to qualify for free school meals if you receive any of the following:

- Income Support
- Income-based Jobseeker's Allowance
- Income-related Employment and Support Allowance
- Support under Part VI of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of Pension Credit
- Child Tax Credit (provided you're not also entitled to Working Tax Credit and have an annual gross income of no more than £16,190)
- Working Tax Credit run-on paid for 4 weeks after you stop qualifying for Working Tax Credit
- Universal Credit if you apply on or after 1 April 2018 your household income must be less than £7,400 a year (after tax and not including any benefits you get)

Please check the government website <a href="https://www.gov.uk/apply-free-school-meals">https://www.gov.uk/apply-free-school-meals</a> for further information or to make an application. Parents have informed us that this is a step-by-step guide which is really easy to access.

## Suduko and Logic puzzle solutions:
