Year 8 Visit to Germany - The BLOG!

Day 1



What I did last summer

For three days my dad, sister and I rode from Stevenage to my grandparents' home in North Devon (Torrington). The first day's ride from Stevenage to Newbury was in temperatures of over 34°c. We followed a route for cyclists but soon found most of this was towpaths alongside canals, where we faced various issues, people, cyclists, animals, etc, but the worst part were the paths themselves, which varied from tarmac to just mud and grass as well as the numerous gates! This slowed our pace; it was hard but enjoyable.

We all looked forward to a good night's sleep before the second day's ride from Newbury to Glastonbury with a break at the house of one of my old school friend's, Amber. The temperatures were going to be high and we found ourselves, once again, on the towpaths. We had to change our route and get onto the roads so, using our trackers (phones), we adjusted our route as if we were a car but with no major roads, which was better.

During this little adventure we had our support team (my mum and brother-in-law, Wade) making sure we were fed and hydrated throughout. The lunch stop at Amber's was wonderful and made the last few miles to Glastonbury a little easier. During the second day's ride, we saw the White Horse of Westbury and the famous Tor at Glastonbury.

After another good rest, we headed into the last day knowing it was probably going to be the hardest, with some monstrous hills in the later stages in Devon. The weather had not let us down and it was another hot day. We headed out early and made good time. We met the support team for lunch some 28 miles from the finish line but what lay ahead was a lot of hard pedalling. The roads we knew well after so many car journeys to my grandparents' house but, on a bike, it's a different matter. Two major hills stood in our way before we would reach our goal; they proved too much for my dad and me and we had to walk them, but my sister, Georgia, showed us the way. We finally arrived at our destination and we all felt great.



The reason we had this little adventure was to help me raise money for World Challenge 2019 in which, through the school and with other students in my year group, I am participating.

The world challenge - Borneo 2019

I will be trekking Mount Kinabalu, which will take around two days to climb the 4,095m peak. It will be a tough two days carrying all of our gear and food as well. After the two-day climb, we are then going to travel to an isolated village to do some voluntary work, helping to build new dwellings or helping construct the new water pipe system. We will also be trekking through the rainforest of Bario (still carrying all our gear) over a number of days.







Supporting your child through KS3 – Year 8

The first report home to parents regarding progress in school is imminent. As a parent, you are your child's most important educator and research shows that parents who are actively involved with their child's learning help their children to achieve more too.

Parental support is crucial to the success of students' learning, and is very much welcomed and appreciated by teachers. Indeed, the importance of parental engagement in students' learning cannot be overstated.

One way in which parents can help - easily and immediately - is by encouraging students to think differently about their learning, and this begins by speaking differently about their learning. The language used at home to discuss learning is as important as that used in school. Classroom teachers are acutely aware of the value of asking probing questions to challenge students to think hard about their learning, and parents are encouraged to adopt this practice at home.

Examples of questions to ask students at the end of their school day are:

- What did you find difficult today?
- What did you manage to improve?

The responses to these questions can open up a useful dialogue about your child's learning, and help students understand that learning is something to be thought about and talked about - and something that everyone can, and should be encouraged to, get better at.

New KS3

KS3 has changed significantly over the past few years and The Nobel School has worked on a new system of assessing students throughout KS3. Nobel's training group model informs students and parents of the student's current working level but this is only meaningful when used in conjunction with success criteria. Each faculty has developed success criteria for each training group within their subject so that students can identify what they have been successful with and what would be the next steps to improve or progress. Success criteria for all subjects can be found on the school's website and can be accessed by selecting the relevant subject form the curriculum tab. This resource can be used to support the dialogue you have with your child regarding their current progress and next steps.
