Students in Year 9 will be given the chance to sign up to begin their Bronze Award shortly, with the Bronze expedition being completed in the summer of Year 10. Students are offered places on the Silver and Gold expeditions during their A Level course and are welcome to begin working towards the remaining sections from the start of Year 11.

# Work Experience at the Bank of England

In late March I had the chance to gain an insight into the central bank of the UK – the Bank of England.

Its purpose, above all, is to maintain the UK's monetary and financial stability by regulating other banks, issuing banknotes, setting monetary policy (moving interest rates) and monitoring risks in the financial system, taking action if required under the guidance of its current governor, Mark Carney.

Whilst at the Bank of England, I worked as part of the Prudential Regulation Authority (PRA); more specifically with a team supervising UK standard chartered banks that operate internationally. I did research on one of the many banks my team was working on at that time in preparation for a meeting, which included people from different parts of the bank and discussion about their routes into the central bank.

My line manager was also involved in making contingency plans in the case of a No-deal Brexit, enabling UK banks' exit from the EU to be as smooth as possible. Thus, I had the opportunity to sit in on a PRA meeting on Brexit which was very interesting and showed me the many measures the bank takes to ensure matters are, and will remain, as trouble-free as possible when/if the UK transitions out of the European Union.

I also got to have a look into the Bank of England Museum (and touch a bar of gold), which gave me a taste of the history that surrounds the bank. Additionally, I received training in identifying counterfeit banknotes and now I can be confident that I can tell the difference.

Overall, this experience made me realise that there is so much more the Bank of England does than just create our notes and set the base rate. There are also different career areas within, which are accessible from all kinds of different pathways.

Many students also included information about the threats environment which currently exist. This led to some very alarming biomes being produced but I am pleased to see that our students understand the problems that we are creating for nature.

We hoped this would make the final easier to judge but it proved an almost impossible task as the effort the students put in was outstanding. 
