We can't wait to see the entries so please support the students in taking part and we will share the winners with you in due course.






Science Club

World Book Day - Thursday 4 March

It was World Book Day on Thursday 4 March, a chance to celebrate stories, books, characters and reading! As well as the numerous academic benefits gained from regular reading, enjoying a book can prove to be a great form of escapism, stress-relief and joy.

At school, we are keen for students to put down their screens and devices and read and celebrate books in the traditional way. However, by engaging technology, where appropriate, we can make challenging texts more accessible, encourage reluctant readers and enable children to share their favourite stories using new approaches that can be both exciting and motivating.

Ms Garner's Audiobook Challenge

According to research from The National Literacy Trust, audiobook sales are growing rapidly. In the last year alone, their popularity amongst young people increased by 138%. New research also shows us that audiobooks can be used to support students' learning. They improve our reading skills and enjoyment of reading, develop our reading comprehension and make challenging texts more accessible.

Each week, Ms Garner has organised for Years 7-10 to listen to an audiobook read by one of the English department. Students then have a quiz on the chapter they have listened to. On completion of the novels, the form with the highest number of successfully completed quizzes will be rewarded with a treat hamper but, more importantly, the opportunity to make a £100 donation to a charity of their choice.




