From the Headteacher

Dear Parents and Carers

The first two weeks back at school were great. Nobelians have all returned with very good intentions, and conduct around the school is much improved. Our system of restorative conversations, where teachers meet with students to discuss issues from the day before is working, and means that all students can make progress. Lockdown has had a profound effect on all young people, we really feel that we have managed the pandemic excellently and we are proud of the way our students are responding.

I can also report more optimism on Covid numbers too, without wishing to 'count our chickens' we have no teachers out of school for Covid, and only five students tested positive on 10 January. However, may I ask that, for the time being, we continue to regularly test at home and make sure that we get our children in school every day. The pandemic might not be over, but it certainly feels as if we have turned a corner, and that we can look forward to a much brighter Spring and Summer – let's hope so!

Finally, I'd like to mention our excellent Sixth Form. Mr MacGuire and his team set very high standards for our students; teaching and learning is outstanding in Years 12 and 13. Our results are very good and most of our students go on to university. Of those going to university, the proportion going to a Russell Group institution increases year on year and we regularly send Nobelians to Oxford and Cambridge. This year we have two students who have been offered places at Oxford and we are waiting for three Cambridge applicants who had interviews before Christmas. This is very exciting and thank you to Dr Mienczakowski, who leads on university entrance, and does such a good job.

National Apprenticeship Week: 7 - 13 February

Knowledge and understanding of apprenticeships are an extremely important part of the students' education and, with the cost of university qualifications, this is an extremely attractive alternative option for your child to explore.

7 – 13 February is **National Apprenticeship Week** (NAW).

Your son/daughter has probably made you aware that the Y8 work shadowing and Y10 and Y12 work experience events are going ahead this year and are planned for June. This is a great time to start discussing and planning your child's experience.

As you are aware, I regularly share information and opportunities with your son/daughter via school assemblies and via email, inviting them to take part in virtual webinar talks with local employers and their staff. These are available via the Hertfordshire Opportunity Portal (HOP). This week's webinar is on Graphic Design.

There are now 45 different webinars available to watch, covering careers from Journalism to Nursing, Construction to Policing and many more.

The school careers tab has the HOP link along with many more hyperlinks to other useful websites, which provide information advice and guidance.

One of the most important considerations with regard to future career prospects is to be aware of the Labour Market Information (LMI), which includes comprehensive details about job opportunities. LMI provides guidance as to whether a future career path is in decline or whether it is part of a growth sector. This helps students identify what the future opportunities might be, but also gives an indication about the potential difficulty of finding jobs in decline as well as highlighting that competition for places will be extremely tough if there are few positions available.

Big Garden Birdwatch: 28-30 January 2022


You may remember last year, I wrote a piece about the RSPB Big Garden Bird Watch. Many students and parents took part and you can see our results in the graph opposite.


