Dear Parents and Carers

As our Year 11 and 13 students begin their examinations - a period of stress and anticipation for each of them – it is worth considering the role that this generation will have to play over the coming years and decades to correct the mistakes and failures of my generation, the so called 'baby-boomers'. They should face these three inter-connected challenges with creativity and ambition. They all require fresh thinking, innovation, and optimism.

As if poverty and climate change were not enough, they with also need to grapple with keeping peace in an unstable world and, given the other two challenges can only be fixed with international co-operation, seeking to establish peace should be target number one.

We are fully aware of the war in eastern Europe and the total lack of humanity being shown to the brave Ukrainians. Nobel Stands with (and walks for) Ukraine

On the afternoon of Thursday 19 May, Nobel School came out in force, with staff and students each walking a mile to raise money and show their support for the people of Ukraine.



To date, this event has raised £2543, and donations are still coming in. In addition, the sale of cakes and sunflower seeds has raised a further £700, which means that the grand total for all three projects is well in excess of £3000.

Dr Tolchenova has advised that an order for much needed medical supplies has already been placed with a UK company called Medtree. The order was made in consultation with the Ukrainian team that works between Kyiv and the areas of Ukraine affected directly by the war and where the fighting is heaviest. The order contains 70 tourniquets, 35 celox packets and some bandages. Once it is delivered, it will go to Poland and then to Ukraine.









Sunflower seeds are still available to purchase for £1 per pack and cakes, priced at 50p, are on sale daily, after school.

Very well done to all three, keep up the good work!








Pathfinders Visit to the University of Hertfordshire



Our resident confectioner, Sally Bolt, served up a treat this week, in readiness for the Platinum Jubilee Celebrations, with these patriotic cakes.






