From the Headteacher

Dear Parents and Carers

Over the years I have had pleasure in telling you about the school's academic performance. We have celebrated Individual achievements and our improvements as a school. However, I cannot remember ever informing you of either attendance or behaviour statistics for the school.

Our attendance has always been comparatively good. In the past our attendance has been pushing 96% - which is outstanding, and a great indicator of attitudes to school among our children and parents. We are incredibly grateful for your support on attendance as, unsurprisingly, there is a direct correlation between attendance and academic achievement. However, since the pandemic attendance has fallen to 93%, although we are well above the national average. Good enough to receive a national award for being in the top 25% of schools for attendance.

Furthermore, it is worth remembering that we do not need to test for Covid anymore. Our guide should be the same as for any other respiratory illnesses, if children feel well enough, they should come to school. As a result, we would expect our attendance to steadily improve towards pre-pandemic levels. Please do what you can at home to help us reach this target.

Behaviour in the school is particularly good. Around 60% of students did not receive a single behaviour point for the whole Autumn term and, when it comes to suspensions (they used to be called fixed-term exclusions), we have far fewer than other comparable schools. In terms of national data, our suspensions were measured at 2.38 per 1000 students, the national average is 7.43 per 1000.

We are constantly working to improve all our outcomes and currently supporting Y11 and Y13 in preparing for their GCSE, vocational and A level examinations, with revision timetables and extra lessons. All of us at Nobel are aiming to improve.

Finally, I wish you all a peaceful weekend and, if your children are involved in taking examinations this summer, take some time to ask them how their revision is going – it will make a significant difference.

A Level English visit to Paris

On Wednesday 8 February, the A level English literature and English language/literature students arrived at Nobel, where we started our journey to Paris. We then made our way to a local restaurant for dinner, whilst taking in some of the famous monuments such as Notre-Dame, the Louvre and some famous literary cafes. After dinner we headed to the hotel to check in and have a good night's sleep.

The next morning, we got up for breakfast and travelled back into central Paris to visit the Louvre. We spent 3 hours walking around the museum, enjoying pieces of art such as the Winged Victory of Samothrace and, of course, the Mona Lisa. Following on from that we went to a monument called the Panthéon where we were able to visit the crypt, where some very famous French figures are laid to rest. In the evening, we took a boat trip along the River Seine and, after dinner, we saw the Eiffel Tower lit up at night, which was definitely a highlight for all of us. After the boat trip we ran to see the Eiffel Tower sparkling, which made a few students very happy, as this only happens for 5 minutes every hour! After taking some amazing photos, we headed back to the hotel to rest in preparation for our last day.



On our final morning we went to the Arc de Triomphe, where some of us decided to take the 284 steps up, to take in the uninterrupted view of Paris. After that, we went to Sacré Cœur, which is a very famous catholic church. Some of us went inside the church to admire the beautiful architecture and light a candle before enjoying some final views of Paris from the summit.



Before departing Paris, we had one final opportunity to buy some souvenirs, ice cream or go on the carousel (this only applies to Amellia). Once we had finished shopping, we got back on the coach and made our way back to Stevenage where we did some karaoke on the coach to end the trip on a high.

Ski Trip 2023 - February Half Term

February half term saw the eagerly awaited Ski Trip 2023 take place, with 122 students and 14 staff members visiting Spain to take to the slopes.

The coach departed Nobel School on Saturday 11 February, at 7:30am, with everybody in good spirits, despite the 23-hour journey ahead. Making up good time, we arrived at the hotel slightly ahead of schedule on Sunday 12 February. After eating breakfast at the hotel, students had the opportunity to explore the local town, visiting the local supermarket and giftshops whilst taking in the breath-taking views. Having completed the initial tour, it was then time to head to the ski shop to collect all the equipment needed to start skiing on Monday.

On Monday, the group headed to Port Áine Ski Station where they were put into groups, based on ability, and began to conduct their ski lessons with dedicated instructors. It was fantastic to see the resilience amongst all of the students despite a fair few falls on the snow! After a journey on the ski lift, a well-deserved lunch was consumed before returning to lessons.

By the end of the first day, all the students had completed the easier green runs with some students completing the trickier blue and red runs. Upon returning to the hotel, the evening entertainment was a quiz, led superbly by Mr Camp. The winning team received a £10 voucher each. By then, the journey and first ski session had caught up with the students, with everybody asleep before lights out!

The following day, we returned to the Port Áine Ski Station for the final time. Students continued to face their fears and challenge themselves, which enabled them to progress onto the red and black runs, which were the trickiest of the resort due to their steepness and potential speed. A particular highlight throughout the trip was the way in which students supported each other whilst learning new skills. The empathy, dedication and determination shown, enabled the students to move onto a more challenging resort.

On Wednesday 15 February, having finished breakfast at the hotel, the group travelled to ESPOT Ski Station which was the final ski destination for the next two days of the trip. It could be argued that this was a more challenging resort with tougher green and blue runs, working up to red and black runs, which all the groups were completing by the end of the trip. After another busy day of skiing, the evening concluded with bingo, with individuals battling it out to win a line and full house for gift vouchers. This was well received by the students and another fantastic way to unwind from a busy day.

Having completed 24 hours of skiing, it was fantastic to be able to see all the students progressing from their initial starting point on the first day. If you had asked any of the students on day one if they would be completing a red run by the end of day four, they would not have believed you! But, at 4:30pm on Thursday 16 February, all the students travelled down the steepest red run with gleaming smiles to return their skis and equipment to the coach for the final time.

On the final evening, students were treated to a pizza from the local pizzeria, whilst Mr Camp and Mr Bell led an awards ceremony, which saw students and staff recognised and rewarded for a range of different categories, including: most spectacular fall, best dressed skier, most supportive, most resilient, most lost items and best co-translator!

The coach departed the hotel on Friday 17 February, finally arriving back to Nobel School on Saturday at 6:50am. Even with the travel issues regarding strikes and delays, we managed to make good time on our journey home, taking the earlier ferry at Calais. This was only made possible by the efficient way the students and staff made it through passport control, despite being tired and awoken from their sleep.



Mock Trials

Punctuality 2023

It takes approximately 21 days to formulate a new habit or routine and our Nobelian's have made our excellent enrichment offer, just one of their many great habits.

Unfortunately, over the previous half-term we have seen that a number of our Nobelians have developed the undesirable habit of being late to their lessons, when it could completely be avoided. A young person is observed as late if the rest of the class have arrived in a timely fashion and the student arriving significantly after their peers, offers no reasonable explanation. The number of minutes they are late is then recorded on the register.

Statistically speaking, a student who is 3 minutes late per lesson, will accrue 15 minutes per day/75 minutes per week. When we consider that students attend school for 36 weeks per year, this equates to 2,700 minutes or 9 days/45 lessons of lost learning all for 3 minutes a lesson.

This half term, we intend to address this issue and re-establish our habit of being punctual to lessons/school.

The Heads of Year will be monitoring their year groups for minutes late to lesson very carefully; they will be assigning consequences to students with excessive minutes late, and students will be required to attend a 'Late to Lesson detention' on Monday after school.

If a student has any pre-arranged conditions regarding the way they attend lessons outside of the norm, please rest assured, these remain in place.
