### From the Headteacher

Dear parents and carers

We had a successful Sixth Form Open Evening on Tuesday. It was great to see so many Nobelians and their parents, as well as students from other schools in the town and elsewhere. The reason for this is quite simple, our Sixth Form is outstanding. With an average of a B grade across twenty-five A level subjects, and a highly successful vocational programme, our students move on to very impressive futures in higher level apprenticeships or going up to university. Furthermore, our students go up to some of the top universities in the country, 112 students went to university, 27% to Russell Group and, last year, four Nobelians gained places at Cambridge. We are proud of all our sixth form leavers, and we will mark their achievements at our annual celebration evening on Monday 18 December.

GCSE results went public on Thursday 19 October, and you will be pleased to know that we gained our best GCSE results. Our students gained results that are almost half a grade higher that students from the average school in England. Suffice to say, it has been an excellent year for results and our students should be congratulated on their hard work and diligence. Furthermore, our teachers have also worked incredibly hard to help our students achieve

The move to closer collaboration with Lodge Farm is moving forward, but there is still much to do. It would be a huge mistake to rush the process, I will continue to report on progress as the year progresses. However, in the short term, we do need to consider the wisdom of both school finishing at 3:15pm. Currently, Mobbsbury Way is over-crowded with both schools finishing their days at the same time. Therefore from Monday October 30 we will shorten our lunchtime by 10 minutes so that we will finish at 3:05pm, there will still be time for lunch and a 20-minute club, and no curriculum time will be lost, in addition children will be getting home in good daylight as the winter draws in and the clocks go back at the end of half term. # **Developing Character**

From 02/10 - 13/10 our fortnightly character focus is on the Nobelian character virtue of being

AMBITIOUS. Please make sure you are discussing this with students within your lessons.

In addition, the Character Conundrum for discussion in form and at home is detailed below:

### **Character Conundrum 3**

Julia was in year 9 and her two best friends were Wendy and Erin. Erin was the most popular girl in the class and all the girls saw her as the leader. One morning Julia arrived at school and Erin was acting weird. When Julia said "Hi" to her, she did not respond. She just looked away and smiled at a group of girls in the corner of the classroom. It did not take long for Julia to figure out that Erin had turned most of the girls against her. But she did not know why! She went to Wendy and asked her why Erin was mad at her. Wendy acted nervous and said that all she knew was that Erin told her that if she hung out with Julia, none of the rest of the girls would talk to her anymore. The rest of that day lasted forever. Whenever the teacher was looking everyone was nice to Julia. But, when her back was to the class, Erin or another girl would throw pieces of paper toward Julia or whisper to each other and look in her direction. Julia thought Wendy would help her, but Wendy just pretended nothing was happening.

That night Julia talked to her parents, and they told her to wait and see if tomorrow was better. If not, they said, perhaps they could help Julia talk to Erin and work through the problem. Julia felt like that would make her look stupid if everyone found out that her mum and dad had to get involved. She knew that sometimes the class would pick on someone, but she never thought her friends would turn against her and do the same thing to her. She felt like she did not have any friends, and nobody liked her. The next day was even worse, and it continued all week. No one wanted to hang out with her at break and she had to sit by herself at lunch.

Here was her dilemma. What should she do now? If she told the teacher about Erin and the girls ganging up on her she would look like a 'snitch', and who knows what the kids would do to her after that?

### **Support**

Even as adults, we can conjure up memories of being the object of peer cruelty. That fact can help when we talk with students about issues like this one. There is nothing more important than social relationships at this age. To underestimate or minimise conflicts that students have around this issue is a sure way to lose connection with them.

Many students will read this and feel sorry for Julia but will also say that nothing THAT bad happens at their school. It is easy for them to relate and empathise with Julia's case and connect it to their own experiences, yet they feel safely distant because it is such a blatant case of unkindness. However, after a few minutes of discussion students often begin to challenge the idea that cliques and unkindness are not a serious issue at their school. They begin to recognise that Julia's situation is more common than they like to think, even if the unkindness comes out in different ways.

It gets students talking about the differences of how boys and girls act toward one another. The indirect actions that girls often use is fairly alien to the more obvious actions that boys seem to prefer. It is helpful to have a case like this which gives all genders permission to talk frankly about why and how this phenomenon plays out in their social lives.

- Can you identify the moral dilemma in this situation?
- What do you think Julia should do now?
- Why do you think Wendy did not stick up for Julia?
- Has this sort of thing happen ever happened to you or to someone you know?
- Have you ever been in Wendy's position? Erin's?

- How do you think this situation would be different if the case involved boys instead of girls?
- Why do you think people pick on others, and why do others join in?
- What do you do when you see or hear someone in your class making fun of someone? Do you join in? Speak up for the person? Say nothing? Why do you think you react that way?
- Have you ever felt that a good friend turned his or her back on you? What happened and what did it feel like?

# Nobel Network Supporting Learning

On Tuesday 10 October, one of our Nobel alumni, Claire Sutton, came into Nobel to speak to our Year 7 students about her role of chief marketing director for the Bahlsen GMBH & Co KG. Claire explained what is involved in marketing a product so that it will sell well to the public or, in some instances, modifying a product to enhance performance. An example being the original glass tomato ketchup bottle, which made it difficult to get all the tomato sauce out, so the bottle was changed to a squeezable plastic one which could go upside down and allow gravity to do its work.

Claire traced her career through school, outlining the GCSEs and A'levels she took before doing a degree in business at Sheffield university. After taking a year out to travel around the world. Claire returned and secured a position in FMCG (Fast moving consumer goods) Marketing. Since then, she has been chief marketer for Bahlsen GMBH & Co KG, where she has designed many a product for companies including Jordans and Ryvita, amongst others.



At the end of the Presentation the students asked Claire many challenging questions about her career to date and what interpersonal skills are required to be a chief marketer.

# **Egg-cellent Year 11 Triple Experiment**


Our triple science class recently delved into physics and the world of forces; with the year 11 students carrying out the egg drop!

By doing this, we investigated the logic behind the art of resultant forces. We carried out the task of having an egg, and taking the responsibility of creating a makeshift protection, and put it to the test, dropping it off a ledge. In this case, we found that the eggs dropped with less protection, were more likely to crack since the air resistance from the parachute was lower, and the egg wasn't slowed down enough.

Whilst many did crack, students were able to establish how forces act upon the object, which was the egg.








# Social Justice Art, Poetry and Song Club


Nobel were proud to host the first secondary event of the academic year, which was the second time this featured in an SSFT events calendar, following its successful launch in the previous academic year.



### Dear Parents/Carers

As part of any occupation, universities or apprenticeships, being on time is a trait that they all view with importance. At The Nobel School we feel the same, especially when it comes to students being on time for lessons. Lessons are planned by our teachers to maximise the time with students, teaching them the content to enable them to be as successful as they can be when sitting their Key Stage 3 and GCSE exams.

Over the first half term we have seen an increase in students being late to their lessons. Whilst we can empathise with students who might be a minute or two late as the corridors were busy or they had to make it from one side of the school to another, to be 5+ minutes late is not acceptable. As you can see from the diagram, late to lessons add up over an academic year equalling invaluable learning time lost, thus putting students at a disadvantage in their exams.



Therefore, from Monday 30 October, if students are consistently late across the school day, they will be collected and will serve a 1-hour detention that afternoon.
