For all education professionals, the tragic death of Ruth Perry is a poignant reminder that external accountability has lost control of itself. As you will have read, the inquest into her death was unequivocally damning of the role that the inspection of Caversham Primary School played, and that the inspection of her 'outstanding' previously school lacked 'fairness, respect, and sensitivity'. I find it unfathomable that qualities that we are expected to show children and families, are the very ones that Ofsted were unable to show to Mrs Perry and her hardworking colleagues. Our thoughts are with the family and friends of Mrs Perry this Christmas.

Unfortunately, I was unable to attend the school panto last week, due to another commitment, but I hear, from my senior colleagues, it was brilliant. The performance was full of laughs, and the audience was full of future Nobelians, all having a great night. The amount of work that goes into these things cannot be overstated, and Mrs Parsley and her team worked tirelessly to get the students ready. Ryan Julier's cool dwarf was spot on, and Chloe Smith shone, as a bumbling kitchen hand. I would also like to give a special mention to Tyler Reade who played the role of the King, and you could see, when he took the applause, he felt like one too.

Thank you to all the students and staff involved.

On Monday evening, we welcomed back over 100 of last year's Y13s. It was lovely to hear about their first experiences at university and in the world of work.

In September we saw 108 students go off to university, with 29 students at Russell Group Universities, including four students going to Cambridge. We also had 17 students begin apprenticeships, at places such as the RAF, MBDA and the Foreign Office.

I wish all our parents, carers, and young people a great Christmas holiday and a Happy New Year.

Students in Years 8, 10 and 12, and their parents will, by now, have received an information pack regarding next summer's Work Experience Week from 1 – 5 July, and Work Shadowing Day (year 8) on Friday 5 July 2024.

Whilst students are encouraged to research and secure their own placements, as part of the broader real-life experience of the world of work, we do appreciate that, sometimes, this can be challenging. With that in mind, the careers team at Nobel works tirelessly with local employers to get them on board and maintain a bank of work placements for students to access if they are struggling to find a suitable placement of their own.

Although it is not always possible, ideally, each student will have an experience of work that matches their interests/future career aspirations, while the employer gets someone who engaged and eager to learn, demonstrating their employability skills; a winwin situation. This is absolutely the best-case truly meaningful scenario, providing а experience for both employer and employee.

Some of the employers we have spoken to, have specified particular criteria that the candidate we put forward must possess and, below, we have listed the first of these niche roles. Sir Stephen Wall Visits Nobel

On Tuesday 5 December, our Year 12 students were very lucky to have the opportunity to hear from a very prominent former Ambassador for the UK, Political Expert and Historian, who came into Nobel to talk about his amazing career.

Sir Stephen Wall was, for 35 years, a member of the British Diplomatic Service. He was private secretary to five British Foreign Secretaries, a press officer for Prime Minister, Jim Callaghan, and foreign policy adviser to Prime Minister, John Major.

His European experience includes five years as Head of the Foreign Office's European Department, two years as Britain's Ambassador to Portugal; five years as UK permanent representative to the EU and four years as EU adviser to Prime Minister Tony Blair and Head of European Secretariat in the Cabinet Office.



Sir Stephen has written a book on Britain's EU policy: A Stranger in Europe, published in 2008. He has also written the Official History of Britain and the European Community, 1963 - 1975, published in July 2012. The successor volume, The Tiger Unleashed, was published in November 2018. Stephen is also an activist for LGBT rights and has, in the past, chaired the Kaleidoscope Trust, which campaigns for the decriminalisation of same sex identity and relationships in commonwealth countries.

The Year 12 students listened very intently and, at the end of the presentation, asked some very well thought out questions. Several students showed a real interest in pursuing a career in the civil service and Sir Stephen really did enthuse them with his life story.

We would like to thank Sir Stephen for an excellent presentation, which took us on a very interesting journey through his life and career to date.

School Games Rowing Competition

The School Games Rowing Competition took place on Tuesday 28 November at Barnwell School, and was led by the Stevenage Sporting Futures Team. Having been reintroduced to the events calendar during the previous academic year, it is now being made an annual event. This was welcome news as our students love competing!

Nobel entered teams from Years 7, 9 and 10, with a total of 23 students competing.

British Rowing have developed a new competition platform for schools. The competition takes place on indoor rowing machines and students work within a team and individually to row a set distance within the fastest time. For the team event, a group of 4 students needed to row 2000 metres, 500 metres each, and for the individual event, students rowed for 200 metres.

Students participated in a practice session before the event to prepare themselves for the competition. For the team event, pacing is key as well as the transition from one teammate moving off the rower and another teammate moving on. For the individual event, the key was working as hard as you can to complete the 200 metres as quickly as possible.

A highly competitive event led to fantastic Nobelian results, as follows:


End of Term Treat for Year 12


On Friday 8 December, Year 12 hit the ice rink in Letchworth for an end of term treat.

Thank you, Year 12, for a wonderful afternoon of fun, and a big thank you also to Mrs Hornett for organising the event.










Quantitative Chemistry Experiment

This term, Year 10 are studying quantitative chemistry. This is a challenging topic, and the students must use their curiosity and ambition to get to grips with it.

On Wednesday, students in 10Ar made up solutions of copper sulphate at varying concentrations. I made a saturated solution at the front using a magnetic stirrer and then the students measured specific volumes of the solution and added water to dilute it. The blue colour of the copper sulphate allowed us to physically see the range of concentrations making an abstract concept more concrete and allowing students to make links between the macro scale observations, the sub-microscopic scale and the symbolic particle model explanation (for more information search '3 levels of chemistry'). You may notice that the solutions are slightly cloudy, this is probably due to the use of tap water rather than distilled water.

This activity allowed students to practice the essential skills of measuring volume and following a method, their results show that they did this with great skill.





The students enjoyed the practical activity, offering praise and advice to their peers and were very pleased with their results. The students of 10Ar are Lisbon, Marie, Cameron, Harley, Toby, Annabelle, Logan, Lily, Shamora and Ajay.

The Chemistry of Sunscreen

In other news, Year 9 have been studying nanoparticles. Nanoparticles can be used in sunscreen to absorb harmful UV radiation from the sun and prevent your skin from being burned.

To investigate the use of nanoparticles in sunscreen, we used a UV torch and some beads which change colour in UV light. Mr Morley was particularly intrigued by this when he visited us in 9xCs.

The students clamped the torch 1cm above the beads and timed how long it look for the beads to change colour. They then spread some sunscreen on a plastic sheet, placed it between the beads and the torch and timed the colour change again. We found that the higher the 'sun protection factor' (SPF) of the sunscreen, the longer it took the beads to change colour. In fact, the time taken for the colour change was equal to the time taken with no sunscreen, multiplied by the SPF of the sunscreen. This helped the students to make a link between what they are learning in science and their everyday lives.



Developing Character

Character Conundrum 6

Sam knew something was weird the second he got to class on Tuesday morning. He saw kids whispering and pointing at him. Some were looking at him funny. He sat down next to his best friend and picked up the graded report that the teacher, Mr Crosby, had marked over the weekend. Sam looked at the "A-" and forgot about the rest of the class for a minute. He had worked hard at that report and was thrilled it had paid off. He looked up and saw a bunch of kids staring at him. While the teacher cleaned up the white board, Sam whispered to Dylan, "What's going on?" Dylan, looked down and said quietly, "Conner told everyone you copied your report from the internet." "But, that's a lie!" Sam said. "I never cheat, and everyone knows it." He was hurt and angry. He couldn't focus the rest of the morning in class.

At break, he went up to Conner and asked him if he had really told everyone he had cheated. "It's no big deal," Conner scoffed. "I only told a few people. Lighten up. It was just a joke." Sam turned and walked away. He wanted to yell at Conner, he just wanted to make Conner feel as bad as Conner had made him feel.

For the next two days, Sam avoided Conner, but Sam and Dylan made up as many lies as they could think of about Conner to get back at him, but it was not helping. Sam was still just as mad at Conner. In fact, all he thought about now was Conner and what he had done.

On Friday, Mr Crosby had all three boys stay to talk with him during break. He told them they had until the end of break to work out whatever it was that was going on between them. If they had not all forgiven each other by the end of break, they had to go to the Headteacher's office. Then Mr Crosby left the classroom. The three boys stared angrily at each other waiting for someone to say something. Sam did not know what to say. All he knew was that he was tired of being mad and hurt. What could he do to make it stop? And what did Mr Crosby mean by all forgive each other?

Support

The idea of forgiveness is a tricky one for all young people, but especially young kids. They do not have sufficient experience understand how forgiving someone can actually make YOU feel better. The act of letting go of negative thoughts and actions is a challenge for young kids and teens because the drama and emotion truly suck them in, and they lose perspective. Once that happens, pride locks them in. Often, they see no real way out. They need help understanding and discussing the concept of forgiveness. They need help to see that they have the power within themselves to achieve peace again, not the person who hurt them.

- Is there someone in your life right now that you might need to forgive for something
- What does it feel like to forgive someone?
 Why do you think that is?

Character Conundrum 7

Maria was worried about her good friend Pam. Pam was always talking about how fat she was and what she was trying to do about it. But the truth was that Pam was not at all fat. In fact, she was downright skinny. Since year 7 Pam had lost at least 15 pounds. Now, they were in year 9 and Maria was afraid that Pam had an eating disorder. Maria was also getting frustrated. Where were all the grown-ups? Who was watching out for Pam besides Maria and her friends? Maria knew that someone from their school had talked to Pam's parents last year, and that Pam's mum had got angry about the school poking its nose into family business. Pam's mum claimed that Pam had a dancer's body and a high metabolism. That was last year. Now things were worse, and Maria felt like she literally watching friend was disappear.

Finally, one Monday afternoon Maria had had enough. As she watched Pam eat just four grapes for lunch, she decided she had to do something. As helpless and scared as she felt now, how would it compare to how she would feel if Pam actually ended up in the hospital...or worse? Pam would be furious if she found out that Maria had talked to someone behind her back. So, Maria had two problems – should she tell someone how bad things were, and if so, whom should she go to?

Support

The issue of divided loyalty never gets old for young people. No matter how clear things might seem to us about when to speak up about a friend's welfare, it is NEVER that clear to the friend involved. This is a classic example of divided loyalty between one's primary identity group and the group one seeks out for authority and moral leadership. Here, it is so important to validate Maria's plight. It is crucial to tell her clearly that she is, indeed, in what seems like an impossible position. And yet, any real friend does not have a choice here. Maria must tell immediately about Pamela's someone situation. It may be helpful to have a short conversation about what the various consequences would really look like when played out.

This case also provides another opportunity to emphasise the importance of finding an adult that one trusts in a young person's community or school. Finally, young people cannot hear enough about what their role regarding responsible behaviour. Pamela's wellbeing is NOT Maria's responsibility. Her only responsibility is to pass on what she knows or is concerned about to an adult. That is it! Often, our kids feel overwhelmed by this sort of issue because they feel they need to own the entire situation.


Questions

- What could the potential consequences be if Maria does not confide in someone?

Science Club

Science club takes place every week on a Wednesday lunchtime. This week, on 13 of December, the students took part in a fun experiment where they found out what ingredients Santa's helpers stole from the cookie mix.

We used flame tests and chemical tests to identify the different components of the cookies such as: sodium bicarbonate, flour and sugar. The students successfully found from the different samples A,B,C,D and E, which was the right ingredient to make the cookies; sodium - orange flame, potassium iodide - lilac flame. Then we used the iodine test and benedicts solution to identify which sample was flour (test for starch) and sugar.

The students were very surprised to see the science behind this and were dazzled by the different coloured flames as well as the colours produced from the chemical tests.

Science Club has many students participating and enjoying themselves, as there is a different experiment each week for them to always learn something new and spark their interest.
