From the Headteacher

Dear Parents and Carers

I could not imagine doing my job without my iPhone 15, and yet I was born in 1961 when mobiles phones were something from science fiction and the only televisions available were black and white, my family did not get a colour television until I was 13 years old. Most of my life was lived happily without a phone, in fact I got my first mobile phone in 2003, at the age of 42. Childhood, school, university, and a large chunk of my career without them. How did we manage?

This is not a piece arguing against the mobile phone, far from it. My argument is that having managed without such a device for so long, why are they now 'essential'? Do our kids really need to bring a phone to school at all? These are big questions, the 'cat is out of the bag' so to reverse technology is not realistic and to ban phones is impractical.

Being 'on your phone' is now a pastime – we all do it. But is it healthy to gaze reels, ponder Tik-Tok or communicate on snap chat. My argument would be the same as it is for life in general - 'everything in moderation' We look at our screentime at a leadership meeting, some of us were horrified with the amount of time spent gazing into our screens. And, what of the quality of the material we are looking at? We know that we can find racism, misogyny, pornography, and violence if we so wish and that not everything, we read on the internet is true. Moreover, research suggests that excessive phone use can have a significant impact on mental health, particularly among young people. Studies have linked high screen time to increased anxiety, sleep disturbances, and lower self-esteem, often due to social media comparison and the pressure to stay constantly connected.

With this in mind, we are going to work with our young people and their families to reduce screen time. We will be surveying students about their mobile phone use, sharing a recent trial where young people gave up their mobile phones and the subsequent benefits, and asking for volunteers to take part in a trial where they look to reduce their screen time. We will be running an online parent workshop to help you with supporting your child. The Safeguarding Team will be in touch soon with more details.

Years 7 and 8 Girls' Cricket Leadership Day 2025

On Thursday 23 January, 21 students from Years 7 and Year 8 took part in Girls' Cricket Leadership Training. The opportunity was led by Hertfordshire Cricket and Chance to Shine and was a wonderful opportunity for the students to join a programme which contributed to The Nobel School winning 'Secondary School of the Year' at the national Chance to Shine Awards in 2024: <u>https://</u> www.youtube.com/watch?v=85ikKDwzFgQ

Students were able to sign up for this opportunity via Satchel One and it was brilliant to be overwhelmed with responses from students who want to develop their leadership skills and grow girls' cricket within the school.

To start the day, the students focused on building the skills of young leaders, which included exploring the skills, qualities and behaviours of a good leader and how they are going to become inspirational role models. The day started with the girls working with partners, using their problem-solving skills in a rope puzzle.

Having looked into the STEP principle, showing the students how to adapt a session, they led their own 10-minute activity focusing on a core skill such as bowling or fielding. They were in charge of collecting their equipment, setting it up and explaining the instructions to their peers. It was impressive to see the students being so creative and putting their own spin on the activities they led. Rebecca was incredibly impressed with how the students pushed themselves out of their comfort zones at every opportunity. In the afternoon, the students learnt the rules to Rapid Fire Cricket, which is a competition format followed by primary schools. In order to show they had learnt everything they needed to know, the students participated in their very own game, taking it in turns to umpire, score and lead to their peers. They managed to get through lots of content in the day, learning new concepts and developing their leadership skills. For many of the students, this was the first time they had looked at cricket in great detail.

Now the students have successfully completed the training day, they will be expected to assist with and participate in the Girls' Cricket Club which takes place every Thursday lunchtime. Students will also have the opportunity to attend local primary school events to assist with the Stevenage Sporting Futures Team and Hertfordshire Sports Partnership Dynamos and Rapid Fire Cricket competitions in the spring and summer terms.

It was fantastic to see the girls so enthused by this opportunity. They fully engaged with the activities throughout the day and are passionate about growing girls' cricket. Thank you to Rebecca from Hertfordshire Cricket for another superb session.

<u>Student Report:</u> The overall experience of cricket leadership was fantastic. We started the day by working on teamwork and communication skills by tying ropes to our hands, tangling ourselves up and working together to free each other. Later, we were put into groups to lead an activity for the other groups to complete. I found this fun as some of the activities we did were really enjoyable and even got a little competitive!

To end the day, we learnt to play and score a game of rapid fire cricket. This type of cricket was really fun and at the end if was extremely competitive with a group winning by only 1 run. I would like to say thank you to Rebecca from Hertfordshire Cricket for running a wonderful event.

University Focus

ACCEPTING OFFERS: Last week, Mrs Saville spoke to Y13 in assembly about accepting offers and here is a brief summary of what we shared. Students will have an individual reply deadline for accepting offers, only once they have received decisions from all of their choices. They can see this deadline on their TRACK profile as seen here:




They make one FIRM choice and one INSURANCE choice. The firm choice is the place they will go to if they make the conditions of their offer, and the insurance choice should have lower conditions of entry. Should they not make the conditions of the firm choice but do meet those of the insurance choice, this is where they go. Students should consider carefully both offers and universities and ensure that they would be happy to go to either place.

Some students are holding *unconditional* offers and, again, we ask students to carefully consider if this is the place they want to go. Despite the name, some of these *do* make conditions such as selecting that university as a firm choice. Level 3 qualifications (A levels and CTECs) do matter and will appear on job applications long after school and university is over, so students must ensure they do not allow an unconditional offer to interfere with their efforts, studies and potential. We have reminded students to look at graduate employment statistics for their university degree and these can be found on a number of university league tables two of which are referenced here: (students can filter by course)



For the next two weeks of school, character focus is on the Nobelian virtue of being considerate.

The Character Conundrum for 03/02/25 - 14/02/25 is below. Please can you take some time during the fortnight to read through this with your child and discuss what the right moral choice would be.

Character Conundrum 10 – CONSIDERATE

On their way home, David and his brother were hungry and decided to have a burger from the local fast-food restaurant. After eating their burgers, David realised that they had made a lot of mess; there were bits of food and packaging all over the place, and even on the floor. He looked over and saw some other people leave the restaurant, leaving their waste behind, and he couldn't be bothered to clear up after himself. The door was right next to where they were sitting. What should he do?

Support

Again, an easy answer for students to identify that they should take their rubbish to the bin, but how many of them would actually do this? There are many times where we see other people do things we know to be wrong but then copy these actions and think '*they got away with it, so will I*'. Someone must clear the mess and, although there are staff in the restaurant paid to tidy up, is it really their job and do we have the right to add to their workload. How would the student feel if roles were reversed?

Questions


- Can you identify the moral dilemma in this situation?
- What would you really do if you were in the same situation?

- How would you feel if you were the person tidying up all the time when people didn't clear up their mess?
- Do you make a mess at home and, if so, who clears up after you? Is that really the role of a parent/carer?
- Would you ever consider saying something if you saw them leave loads of mess?






