Dear parents and carers

However, at the same time, there has been an increase in poor behaviour and unsupportive parents who would prefer to question the school's decisions rather than the behaviour of their sons and daughters. Furthermore, over the last few years, we have also seen an increase in aggression and rudeness to members of staff, I fear that this reflects changes in wider society but, surely, we can do better than that. Our fantastic receptionists get more than their fair share of this rudeness, usually about an issue that they have not been involved in. It is vitally important that relations between home and school remain cordial; we are on the same side, always working in the best interests of all Nobelians. Please be reassured that we are all doing our best but, like all organisations, we sometimes get things wrong, we are always happy to apologise when this happens.

On a more positive note, there has been so much going on outside the classroom this half-term, for example a couple of weeks ago sixth formers Austin Holland, Sam Huttlestone and Teddy O'Brien took part in a World Cancer Day charity event organised by 'We Can Kick It.' London Football Stadium Walk in aid of We Can Kick It

On Tuesday 4 February, three Year 13 students, alongside Mr Moore, took part in the London Football Stadiums fundraising walk with the aim of raising £500 for the We Can Kick It charity.

We Can Kick It provide free footballing opportunities for children tackling cancer. Austin Holland, Samuel Huttlestone and Teddy O'Brien had previously given up their time to coach at a We Can kick It event last July. Inspired by what they had seen on the day, the Nobel team wanted to take part in the stadiums walk.

The main walk covered 40 miles starting from Crystal Palace Football Club and ending at the GTech Arena, the home of Brentford. The Nobel team joined the walk from the home of Arsenal FC then onto Chelsea FC and finally Fulham FC.

The route the team covered was approximately 20 miles and, at each stadium, access was given and photo opportunities were made available.

The highlight of the day was at Fulham FC, who greeted the walkers with hot food and drink and also the entire stadium was lit up in yellow and black, which are the colours of the charity.

The overall event raised over £17,000 pounds and the sixth form team had a great time seeing behind the scenes at the Premiership clubs.





a wide range of industries and education providers to learn more about potential careers and the opportunities that are available. This year's careers fair promises to be bigger and better than ever!

With almost 40 exhibitors expected to attend, across a wide range of employment sectors, we are giving more students the opportunity to benefit from the opportunity of a face-to-face conversation with a specialist in their area of interest.

The event will run from 9:00 am until 1:20 pm and each year group (from 9 - 13) will be given a time slot to attend.

We would ask parents to support us in encouraging their son/daughter to make the most of this annual opportunity and to seek out the exhibitors that may be of interest to them. Exhibitors usually bring lots of literature with them, but students should not be afraid to ask questions and, if appropriate, to make notes.

For those students in Y10, who have not yet secured their work experience placement for the summer, this is the perfect place to look for inspiration as you may find something you had not thought of before.

Work Experience - While we are not yet out of winter, the work experience (Y10) and work shadowing (Y8), scheduled for the last week of the school year in July, must seem a very long way off. However, every placement requires a considerable amount of planning, preparation and checking, and at the time of writing, just under 10% of Y8 students and just under 15% of Y10 students have returned their forms.

Careers information packs were distributed immediately after the October half term holiday to give students (and their parents/carers) plenty of time to secure a meaningful placement, and students were asked to return their completed forms to their form tutor as soon as possible. The absolute deadline for return is the end of March, which is only a few weeks away.

Exploring Quantum Gravity at the University of Hertfordshire

On Wednesday 29 January, Ashley and Lily attended an Institute of Physics lecture about Quantum gravity at the University of Hertfordshire.

The need for a theory of Quantum Gravity is recognised as one of the big gaps in theoretical physics. What is a quantum theory of gravity and why don't we have one?


Professor Evans introduced the quantum theory of electric forces (Year 12 Physics) that works very well and shows how gravity is different, causing problems. A leading contender for a resolution is string theory but it predicts many strange new ideas such as extra dimensions and membrane like objects. More recently the idea that string theory is really a holographic projection of a lower dimensional theory has been shown. From A-level to Nobel-prize winning Physics, Professor Evans covered such a tangled topic making it accessible to a wide audience. The subject is not yet solved, so there are opportunities to contribute to its research for many years into the future.



The Student view from Ashley in Year 12

On 29 January, I went to a lecture on quantum gravity at the University of Hertfordshire. Whilst the content was advanced, and the teaching out of my usual learning style, I felt like it was a very useful experience to have. The lecture will help to prepare me for university life and, considering we're going to begin Quantum Mechanics in A-Level physics rather soon, this was a good preparation and puts me in a stronger position.

Nick Evans is a professor of theoretical physics and head of the theoretical physics group at Southampton University. He studies the strong interactions in the nuclei of atoms, at heart between quarks (Year 13 Physics). He has been exploring the links to string theory through a famed duality that provides a holographic projection of the theory into a theory of gravity. Recently he has been interested in whether the Higgs boson might be a bound state of some new particles; and whether there is a plasma of quarks at the centre of neutron stars.

The lecturer was very concise and the topic clear. I was incredibly surprised to be hit with the reality check of just how weak gravity is, the lecturer pointing out that, even the Earth, with all its incredible mass, the gravitational field can be surpassed with just tensing our muscles to jump off the ground. It was also a reality check to find how hard it is for people to measure gravity, especially on a small scale. There were also some more humorous aspects such as his approach to string theory and other abstract ideas. This was a very enjoyable experience if you are interested in STEM, and I would happily recommend this to other students in STEM subjects.

GCSE Art & Design Trip to the British Museum

On Tuesday 4 February, all Year 11 Art & Design students went to the British Museum to complete drawings from first hand observation. This work is evidence in support of their GCSE examination theme, which, for this year, is 'gathering' and will prove invaluable in helping them develop ideas for their outcomes in their final exam in April.

Students explored artefacts in a variety of galleries, showcasing Egyptian, African and North American cultures.

This work, and the rest of their coursework projects, will be on display in the annual Nobel GCSE summer exhibition.

Update on Y12 Sports Leadership Course - Spring 2025

As per previous newsletter editions, the PE Department have been delighted to offer students the opportunity to complete the Level 3 Sports Leadership Qualification through the Leadership Skills Foundation.

The Year 12 Sports Leaders have continued to make excellent progress on the course, working through the units. Most recently, students have been exploring the different types of sport and physical activity sessions. Students have been participating in a range of practical sessions, exploring sitting volleyball, blind football, sports day/mini-Olympics activities and a badminton skill development session.



The aim of this unit is to provide the students with a range of different session ideas which they will then use to plan three progressive sporting sessions. These will be delivered to Year 3 children from Lodge Farm and Year 7 students from Nobel after the February half term. During these sessions, the leaders will be assessed on different areas of their delivery including communication, adaptive teaching and motivational methods used. Further practical sessions will prepare the students for this.

On Tuesday 28 January, Carol Littlewood, a farm conservation adviser and former Nobelian, talked to our year 8 students online from Scotland, where she work and lives.

Carol's role involves working with landowners; farmers, estate owners, councils and even private house owners, to advise on how they manage their land. Carol originally worked for a charity called FWAG (Farming and Wildlife Advisory Group), which was run committee farmers by of interested а In conservation. Carol explained that FWAG does still exist in various forms in England but the Scottish branch went into liquidation in 2009 due to a cut in funding from the Scottish Government, so she set up on her own doing the same job. Carol's work is very varied and includes:

- Completing agri-environment scheme applications to help landowners carry out conservation work on their land
- Surveying sections of river where the local council is to be carrying out any work, to make sure they don't damage important habitats or protected species
- Producing biodiversity plans for farmers as part of their whole farm plans and also for quality assurance schemes such as LEAF Mark
- Drawing up grazing and management plans for NatureScot on designated sites such as SSSIs (Sites of Special Scientific Interest)
- Advising and surveying for protected species relating to planning applications such as barn conversions, and how to incorporate biodiversity into building works.
- Carol is Chair of the Tayside Biodiversity Partnership (TBP) Farmland and Upland Working Group and is on the South Esk Catchment Partnership (both unpaid posts).

7. Carol also delivers species and habitat projects when she can get funding, which can be difficult as an individual rather than a charity or constituted group. Carol is currently delivering a tree sparrow project in Perthshire, providing advice and putting up nest boxes with householders and farmers in two small villages which are part of the TBP's "Biodiversity Villages Project". Over the years Carol has done lots of projects benefiting barn owls, tree sparrows, species-rich grasslands, hedges, treelines, etc

Carol has also had a contract to work parttime as the Project Co-ordinator for the education charity, RHET (Royal Highland Education Trust) in Angus and Dundee. This involves:

- Being the link between schools and the farmers who volunteer for the charity, organising visits to farms or farmers going into school to talk to classes about food and farming
- Organising their big events such as Food & Farming Days, Estate Days, Sustainability Days, each of which gets 180 pupils out for a day-long event in a rural setting
- Developing resources relating to food and farming, filming for events such as 'Talk to a Farmer' sessions
- Running projects such as our Angus Potato Project, which has 1,000 pupils a year growing potatoes in their schools.
- Carrying out the risk assessments for all the above

Ex Nobelian, Elana Dance, came in to speak to our year 9 students about quantity surveying. The students really found Elana's presentation informative, as she explained how she progressed through her school career at Nobel, achieving her A 'Levels and then going onto study quantity surveying at university. Elana now works for Morgan Sindall.

"I am now considering a career in construction/housing" "Elana's talk was very interesting - some of the buildings to thank them both for giving up their time and and houses she has worked on were incredible!"





Stevenage School Games - Y7 Sports Hall Athletics Competition

On Thursday 6 February, the Year 7 Sports Hall Athletics teams visited Barnwell School for the annual Sports Hall Athletics competition led by the Stevenage Sporting Futures Team. All of the secondary schools within Stevenage participated, with the aim of winning a medal.

The Sports Hall Athletics competition is led indoors and features a range of track events including: relay, 2-lap individual and 8-lap paarlauf, and field events including: triple jump, shot putt and speed bounce. Typically, students compete in 2 track events and 2 field events across the competition, requiring an incredible level of skill to be able to participate in a range of different events.

This year, all year 7 students took part in an indoor athletics lesson in PE, participating in a range of events. From this, all of their scores were reviewed and 34 students were invited to attend a lunchtime club. Finally, 15 students were then shortlisted to represent Nobel at the competition.

The teams worked incredibly hard, both individually and as a group, participating in a range of track and field events. They supported each other incredibly well.

The Year 7 boys finished in an impressive 3rd place with 148 points, taking home the bronze medals. The Year 7 girls finished in 2nd place, taking home the silver medals, accumulating 146 points. This means that every Nobel student who participated left with a medal.

Developing Character

For the next two weeks of school, character focus is on the Nobelian virtue of being conscientious.

The Character Conundrum for 24/02/25 - 07/03/25 is below. Please can you take some time during the fortnight to read through this with your child and discuss what the right moral choice would be.

Character Conundrum 11 – CONSCIENTIOUS

Tina must do a geography project in a group of four, with two of her friends and another student called Chloe. Chloe is the class brain and always scores top marks in the tests. They have to complete a 5000-word essay between them over the weekend, but Tina's two friends have said they are going to skip it and go to the cinema instead – they are sure Chloe will, no doubt, do it all for them. Tina wants to go to see the film too and spend time with her friends but is it fair to leave Chloe to do all the work? What should she do?

Support


This conundrum has a lot to unpick; does it matter whether Chloe is bothered about doing all the work? What about if you know she wouldn't say anything? Students must consider what the proper thing to do is. It doesn't matter whether there would be any come back from this decision, allowing one person to do all the work while others take credit is morally wrong. Students need to consider how they would feel if roles were reversed, and the inevitable feeling of injustice that they would undoubtedly feel.

Questions

- Can you identify the moral dilemma in this situation?
- Hand on heart, would you help Chloe or go to the cinema?
- If you did go to the cinema and Chloe did all the work, would she be justified in telling the teacher what had happened?

- Have you ever allowed someone to do more than their fair share so that you can do less?
- Would it make a difference if you knew that Chloe wouldn't say anything to the teacher?
- If the two friends are happy to let Chloe do all the work, do you think they might do the same to Tina in the future?
