




KS3 Science club

Nobel Network - Guest Speaker

Nobel Network working in school Arti Odera, Senior Consultant, Lidl International Class of 2011

We had the pleasure of welcoming Arti Odera to give an online presentation to our year 10 students on the 1 December. She talked with such enthusiasm to students about her journey since leaving Nobel and extremely useful advice about finding their future careers.

Arti described her time at school being pivotal in sending her off positively into the world but also spoke about how she didn't know



what her long-term career aspirations were. She chose to follow her passion which was history and went off to Brunel University to start the next phase of her development. At university she developed her independence, her ability to budget, self-motivate and organise herself, skills that helped her to secure her first job.

What became clear throughout her talk was that while she picked up professional skills throughout her career - such as strategic thinking, stakeholder management and prioritisation, the real key to success was her building of positive relationships in each of her workplaces. Each new experience offered her the opportunity to build great relationships with people who subsequently offered her a step up on the ladder with bigger and more well-paid jobs. This also allowed her to continue her personal development throughout her career.

One of Arti's jobs was working in the House of Commons to promote it as an employer. Aside from MP's and their staff, the House of Commons has over three thousand staff that keep the organisation running, and it is run very much like a business. It has a remarkably diverse range of jobs including 'Clock Mechanics', whose role is to manually change the 2,000 clocks throughout the Palace of Westminster and across the Parliamentary Estate after daylight saving!

Some of the key messages from the presentation were:

- **Follow your interests:** It's fine not to know your lifelong career goal. Focus instead on following your passions, interests, and the things that you are good at.
- **Do your research:** Many organisations have jobs that you might never have even heard of, so do your research and be open to these opportunities as you develop in the workplace.
- **Keeping building on your skills:** Actively pick up as many skills as possible throughout your academic, personal and professional life. Learning never stops!

Relationships are key: Always try to build good relationships and work to the best of your ability. You never know who could give you the next opportunity.

We asked Arti what might make Nobelians successful in future job markets?

Getting a job after school or university can be tough. Think about companies like Lidl—their jobs often get **over 120,000 applications** every year! This means you have to find ways to make yourself completely different from everyone else. This difference is your **Unique Selling Point** (your 'special power').

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To build your special power, try to:

- **1. Get hands-on experience:** Do different kinds of **work experience** and **volunteering**. This shows you can handle real jobs.
- **2. Have a story:** When you talk to an employer, have **something interesting to say** that shows your personality and passions.

Employers look for skills they can't teach: attitude and effort. They want people with a positive attitude, who are resilient (meaning they bounce back when things are hard), and who are brilliant at working with others in a team. You can always learn job skills later, but if you start with the right mindset, passion, and willingness to learn, you will absolutely stand out from the crowd!

We were grateful for Arti giving up time on her day off and wish her every success as she enters her next phase of working for Lidl International in Germany.

Chris gave a very informative talk to our year 11 students about how he managed to move from school to his current career working as a software engineer manager for Tesco.

Chris managed to achieve his GCSE's and then went on to Study A 'level at Nobel School. This is his career pathway until present day –

- English is Logical thinking
- Mathematics you use formulae
- **Science** you use Experimentation a large amount when trialling software

- 2. Creativity / problem solving
- 3. Focus / persistence
- 4. Empathy / understanding of business and user needs

Chris's advice to you all would be – to be open minded, and you'll be surprised at how many things help your personal development as an engineer!

The career pathways open to students in Tesco as a software engineer are –

- Design / UX Creating prototypes and visual designs
- Engineering Designing systems, writing code
- Product Management Strategy and vision


The Nobel School Careers Fair 2026

Cancer Charities mean a lot to Nobel

Cancer is a word that brings fear and uncertainty, affecting not only those diagnosed but also their families, friends, and communities. For many of us at Nobel, cancer is a very personal experience.

Between 2019 and 2021, both of my sisters were diagnosed with breast cancer and my dad with bowel cancer. These experiences led me to begin fundraising for cancer charities in 2021.

When I joined Nobel in January 2022, the school was already proudly supporting Macmillan. Sadly, cancer has touched many within our community, and this year we lost two much-loved colleagues, Rebecca and Brett, who are greatly missed.

Nobel has continued to support cancer charities through a range of fundraising events. This year alone, we raised £389 for Breast Cancer Now through a *Wear It Pink Day* and cake sale, and £1,000 for Macmillan during *Meet the Form Tutor Day*. Since fundraising began, nearly £2,500 has been raised for Breast Cancer Now, and almost £5,400 for Macmillan.





With almost 3.5 million people currently living with cancer in the UK, supporting research and care has never been more important.

In January, I will be taking part in the **Walk 62 Miles Challenge** to raise money for Cancer
Research UK and help fund life-saving research.




Yr 11 'A Christmas Carol' Performance

Developing Character

Dear Students and Parent/Carers

For the two weeks between 05/01/26 and 16/01/26, the character focus is on the Nobelian virtue of being **RELIABLE.**

The Character Conundrum for the fortnight is below. Please can you take some time during the fortnight to read through this with your child and discuss what the right moral choice would be.

Character Conundrum 8 – RELIABLE

Suzy has been invited to the party of the year. Literally everyone who is anyone is going. The only problem is that, although her parents have said she can go, they have asked that she makes sure she is home before 10pm. On the evening, Suzy is really enjoying herself and would happily stay all night, but it is now the time to leave if she is going to make it home by the time her parents ask. She knows she should leave but her friends are begging her to stay saying 'how much trouble will you really be in if you are a couple of hours late?'. What should she do?

Support

Many students will just see this as a twooption dilemma - stay or go? However, there is a
third option – ask. Frequently students think they
know what the answer will be and
therefore don't want to ask the question. It is
as if they feel that, if they don't ask, then
they aren't actually disobeying, despite a clear
boundary set in place previously. If Suzy is not
going to ask her parents, then this boils down to
how much she respects her parents and can she be
relied upon and trusted to respect her parents'
wishes.

Questions

- Can you identify the moral dilemma in this situation?
- Would you stay or go home?
- If she decides to stay out, does it make a difference whether she is 10 minutes late or an hour late? If you were a parent, would this matter to you?

- Would it make it worse if Suzy asked to stay longer, her parents said no but she stayed anyway?
- What would the impact be if she stays out and then has future parties she wants to go to?

Character Conundrum 9 – KIND

Jemma is on her way home and she passes an elderly gentleman Mr Green who is struggling to carry his shopping from his car to his front door. He has usually been grumpy towards her, and she is in a bit of a rush to get home for her favourite TV programme – what should she do?

Support

Most, if not all, students will identify that they should help the man and offer to carry his shopping for him, however, how many, hand-onheart would actually do this? During our lives, there are multiple situations where we can all support or help those in need, but when it is a truly selfless act, and there is no benefit to us, often the situation passes us by, and we have failed to act. The added information about Mr Green being grumpy in the past could invoke a hesitation from some students and a notion of whether he *deserves* to be helped. It is societies duty to help those in need, not for weaker individuals to earn our support.

Questions

- Can you identify the moral dilemma in this situation?
- Do you think you should help Mr Green? Would you actually offer though?
- Does it matter that he has been grumpy towards Jemma in the past?

- Should people only be offered our help if they deserve our help?
- Does Mr Green's age or gender make a difference? Why/why not?
